Protest Council Giving Grant To Federation of Agriculture

A deputation headed by Robert Hamilton waited on Eramosa council at their meeting on August 7, and presented a petition protesting giving a grant to the Federation of Agriculture. The petition was placed on record to be presented at the January meeting of the council. The 1956 grant to the Federation was passed, and the clerk was instructed to notify the Federation of Ag-

riculture that in the future if they wished money from the municipality some other method than a grant must be found.

The clerk reported having received the unconditional grant of \$4,375.20 from the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

The treasurer of the Eden Mills Community Club was to be paid \$1,290, the provincial grant received, as requested by the Eden Mills trustee board.

Five additional street lights are to be ordered for Eden Mills. The trustees of the police village requested the lights and the village will bear the cost.

Rae Freure, on behalf of the Wellington county fair board, asked council for a grant of \$100 toward the building program. The request was ordered filed for the next meeting.

The restricted area by-law was discussed with members of the planning board and passed. The by-law prohibiting dogs from running at large was repealed in the township.

Accounts passed for payment amounted to \$3,558.74.
