**Cape Breton Sees Old Officers Gone In Postal Routes**

Sydney, N.S. (CP)—Local tradition and a bit of history went by the board when the postal department recently established a mail route between St. Peter's and Irish Cove and discarded six local mail outlets.

One of the post offices, at Red Islands, has been in the MacKenzie family for three successive generations.

Alexander MacKenzie, better known in his time by Gaelic neighbors as "Allisear," was appointed Red Islands' post master about 1831. His house was the only mail outlet between St. Peter's and East Bay, a distance of 45 miles.

When Alexander died his son Martin received the appointment and he in turn left it to his son, Murdoch, in 1929.

Rarely did anyone call for the mail in those three generations without making a short "ceillidh" or visit, and receiving a cup of tea. Only the post offices, which were invariably in private homes, furnished a ready excuse for neighbor to meet neighbor over a cup of tea.

One sad fact: There must have been a million cups of tea served at MacKenzie's.

At one time "ceillidh" was an institution among the hardy Cape Breton islanders but improvements in communications and the influx of radio, television and movies all but did away with it.
