### Lawn Bowling Entries Doubled Possibility for Next Season

Success of the first season of the Inter-County Lawn Bowling League has been so evident that there is a possibility of the number of clubs being doubled for 1957. Developments in furtherance of that idea may mark the closing celebration of the league set for the afternoon and evening of September 8 in Guelph.

There is to be a post-season tourney of mixed doubles and triples on the Guelph greens, followed by an evening dinner in the club room and a further program, including presentation of the Beardmore Trophy and prizes for the day's jitney.

News received here from Bill Currie of Hillsburgh, now a member of the Guelph club, is that definite action has been taken for the formation of a new lawn bowling club in Erin.

The idea has been advanced that, by interest shown, lawn bowlers of Elora, Preston, Galt and Milton might be influenced to enter teams in the league next year, to result in the formation of two districts, one to include Georgetown, Acton, Rockwood and Erin, and the other to include the other teams, with separate schedules of games for each district or an interlocking schedule, which will have to come up at a meeting of the executive at a later date. Play-offs for the Beardmore Trophy, emblematic of the league championship, would follow.

George Perry of Rockwood, president of the Inter-County League, expressed enthusiasm respecting the general aspects of the league in its first year and satisfaction respecting the possibility of a two-section league next year. It was found that the new league so extended interest in the Rockwood club that the membership has mounted to a record total, including women members for the first time. Five already have joined with prospects of more to follow. Another new player there is 15-year-old Ronnie Bassell, occasioning the hope that other junior players will be identifying themselves with the club.

The other clubs had much to say also of the league, and of the friendship that has been caused. Jim Fleming and the Acton club have been thanked for the formation of the league. The Acton club would like any who are interested to come out. Juniors who would like lawn bowling are to give Harry Rogers a call at 28w.

#### Mrs. Harold Mowat Was Noted as Singer

Acton friends gathered with relatives at Fairview cemetery Monday morning for the committal service for the late Mrs. Harold Mowat. In failing health for some years, she had passed away suddenly in Sudbury Memorial hospital on Thursday, August 24. Funeral service was held in Copper Cliff Sunday, with interment here Monday.

The former Mary Gertrude Miller, she was born in San Francisco, California. A nurse, she met Dr. Harold Mowat there and they were married 30 years ago. When Dr. Mowat went to England to study, Mrs. Mowat lived here in Acton for about three years with Mrs. J. A. Mowat. A talented singer, she was a member of Acton United church choir while she was here, and made many friends in town. After two years in Toronto, Dr. and Mrs. Mowat moved to Copper Cliff, where they have made their home for the past 17 years. Dr. Mowat, F.R.C.S. (Eng.) is the chief of staff of the Inco hospital there, operated by the International Nickel Company, and the honorary chairman of Sudbury Memorial hospital.

Mrs. Mowat sang frequently to appreciative groups in the north, and retained her interest in the Acton choir, which she visited. Lately she was particularly interested in the work of the Sudbury hospital and at her request, donations were given to the hospital in lieu of flowers at the time of her death.

Mrs. Mowat, who was in her 54th year, had undergone a lengthy illness. Funeral service was held on Sunday evening in Copper Cliff United church, banked with flowers. Nurses and doctors of Copper Cliff and Sudbury joined with friends and family in paying their last respects. Shriners of Sudbury acted as honorary pallbearers. Rev. M. Masecar officiated.

On Monday, after arrival by train, committal service was held in Fairview cemetery. A friend of the family and former minister in Copper Cliff, Rev. F. J. Baine of Stoney Creek, officiated.

Pallbearers were Murray Smith, William Middleton, Ernie Barr, Mac Symon, Earl Cooper and David Dills. Surviving Mrs. Mowat as well as her husband are three daughters, Mrs. Harry Smith (Margaret), Quirke Lake; Frances Elizabeth and Kathryn Aileen, at home. A son died following an accident some years ago. She had two sisters and one brother in California.


