Two Local Finalists Halton Girl C.N.E. Queen

Dolores (Mrs. Gordon) King, who lives on the Dundas Highway near Trafalgar, was last night crowned Queen of the Dairy Queens at the Canadian National Exhibition by Premier Leslie Frost. Winning the title not only meant fame and a wealth of prizes to the plucky milk maid, but it brought her to Halton County, which had three other girls entered in the contest. Dolores, naturally, was overjoyed at winning the title in this, the first competition of its kind held at the C.N.E. Premier Frost presented her with the Dairy Queen Trophy donated by the Ontario Milk Distributors' Association, and M. G. Simpson of the Association presented a sterling silver tray to the winner. She was given her choice of any one of five purebred heifers—one of each dairy breed entered in the contest—and as she was milking a Guernsey cow when she won the title, she naturally picked that breed as her prize. This was donated by Laura Secord Candy Shops, a large user of dairy products. On top of all this, Dolores won a feature spot at the last three grandstand performances tonight, tomorrow and Saturday night. And she is scheduled to appear on the Country Calendar TV show this Sunday. Winning this contest wasn't any pushover for the 25-year-old mother. First she had to make her costume—white cap, blouse and pedal-pushers. Then Friday night of last week she competed against four other Ontario girls for that night's Queen of the Fair title—and won. For this, she received \$25. Then she was placed on a huge float, taken out in front of a crowd of 20,000 at the evening grandstand performance, and got a chance to meet the singing and dancing stars of the show. Next came the hardest chore, that of winning the top title. Altogether 50 girls competed in the whole contest, five each night. The best milker of each of the five breeds represented—Jersey, Guernsey, Holstein-Friesian, Ayrshire and Dual-Purpose Shorthorn—was chosen to compete last night. So she really had tough opposition. Among the other four girls competing in the finals was Jean Peterson, another Halton girl from the Hornby district. Jean had been named the first Queen of the Fair when she won the title in the first contest. The other three girls were from Brant, Halton and Ontario counties, and each received \$15 cash as well as other prizes.

United Church At Eden Mills Has Centenary

Eden Mills United church, Eden Mills, will be celebrating its 100th anniversary, September 9, with 11 o'clock and seven o'clock services taking the place of the regular Sunday afternoon service. The minister, Kenneth Griffiths, will set the order of service and arrange the many details for both services. Rev. Carmen Dyer will be the guest speaker for the morning service. Rev. Glen Taylor, chairman of the Guelph Presbytery and minister of Melville United church, Fergus, will be the guest speaker for the evening service. The newly-formed choir of the Eden Mills United church, under Miss Kathleen Stanley, is preparing a special program for the morning. The choir of the Rockwood United church is expected to sing at the evening service. Through the generosity of a friend, who wished to remain anonymous, a sum of money was presented to the church that is to be used to purchase new hymn books. Though the church is celebrating its 100th year as a congregation, it is at least a few years older than this, though no records remain to point out the exact year. First mention of this congregation is found in the Nassagaweya Circuit book at a quarterly meeting held on April 5, 1856 in Ebenezer chapel on the Guelph Road. At this early date, the church was known as the "Canadian Wesleyan Methodist New Connexion Church." A list was found of the names of the congregation in 1858. There were 22 members and at least three of these have descendants living today in the village and nearby. Mrs. William Mino's grandparents, John and Mary Millard, were two on this early list. Lindsay Tolton's great-grandfather, Joseph Langdale, is another man. Joseph Langdale was also the grandfather of Miss Sadie Roberts. Mrs. Will Lowrie, on the Guelph Road, is a niece of Mashack Bardwell, he having no direct descendants. It was Meshack Bardwell who with Henry Darby was co-giver of the church's first Bible for the pulpit. It was given by these two gentlemen in 1861, the year the present church was built. Mrs. Mino was given this Bible recently by the congregation when a new one was purchased. The name Hortop, once so well known in Eden Mills, is on this early list. Elizabeth and Henry Hortop being two of the members of the 1858 congregation. In the following years, many families joined this church, one being the Hampson family who have descendants in the village today. A special guest book has been purchased for the anniversary and Mr. Griffiths and the congregation hope that former members and descendants of those who once belonged to this little stone church, will return for this special occasion. Clare Macpedoram, lands and forests minister. Ptarmigan: September 1, 1956 to April 1, 1957; bag limit, five a day, possession limit 15. Raccoon: August 23, 1956 to October 31, 1957. Squirrel (black, gray and fox): November 5 to November 17. Rabbit: November 3, 1956 to February 28, 1957. Bag limit, six cottontail rabbits in one day, purchase or sale prohibited.
