The dairy producers in Ontario have sponsored this butter modelling exhibit for the past six years and have modelled likenesses of H. R.H. Queen Elizabeth and her horse Winston, the Honorable T. L. Kennedy, the Rt. Hon. J. G. Gardiner, Minister of Agriculture for Canada, and the Premier of Ontar-Honorable Leslie Frost, as well as other well known persons.

The image modelled from solid butter requires about 300 pounds of first grade creamery butter. Sculpfor Donald Stewart of Vancouver estimates that this exhibit will take him approximately 105 hours to ownplete. Mr. Stewart is head of the sculpturing department of the Vancouver School of Art.

The exhibit will be on display during the Canadian National Exhibition which opens August 24 and closes September 8.
