

To Televis Legion Zone Parade Sunday

Next Sunday's Decoration Day service and zone parade in Georgetown will be featured on TV on at least one district station and possibly two.

The parade, which is expected to be one of the biggest held in some time will form at the Legion Hall in Georgetown at 2 p.m. and proceed to the cenotaph, then to the cemetery for services.

It is hoped units will be representing branches of Zone B-7 from Brampton, Streetsville, Milton, Acton, Port Credit, Oakville as well as Georgetown's local unit, Branch 120.

This will be the first time that a parade of this sort has been televised in Georgetown.

Sir Winston Statue in Butter At the Exhibition

The life-size likeness of Sir Winston Churchill in solid butter will be the attraction of dairy lane in the Coliseum at the Canadian National Exhibition this year. The Milk Producers' Co-ordinating Board has just announced that the work is now underway on the sculpturing and Sir Winston has given his permission for this display.

The dairy producers in Ontario have sponsored this butter modelling exhibit for the past six years and have modelled likenesses of H. R.H. Queen Elizabeth and her horse Winston, the Honorable T. L. Kennedy, the Rt. Hon. J. G. Gardiner, Minister of Agriculture for Canada, and the Premier of Ontario, Honorable Leslie Frost, as well as other well known persons.

The image modelled from solid butter requires about 300 pounds of first grade creamery butter. Sculptor Donald Stewart of Vancouver estimates that this exhibit will take him approximately 105 hours to complete. Mr. Stewart is head of the sculpturing department of the Vancouver School of Art.

The exhibit will be on display during the Canadian National Exhibition which opens August 24 and closes September 8.

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Assess C'ville Chances In Coming Final Series

Campbellville baseball team is expected to open the Intermediate A finals in Campbellville this Saturday against the winners of a series now in progress between Coburg and Havelock. Originally there were four entries in this class which takes in cities up to 15,000 population, but when Oshawa dropped out, it left the Havelock champions with a bye into the finals.

It is difficult to assess just how good Campbellville's chances are in their first effort in this high classification. They have a good record over the season of 19 wins, four losses and one tie, but they are bound to suffer from the long layoffs they have had since mid-July. They have played only seven games in the last eight weeks.

Although they were winning games early in the season, their defensive play never a strong point with this team was not good. However, in their last two series it improved considerably and if they can keep it up, their chances should be quite good.

The pitching which has always been excellent, is probably about the same as last year. Jack Roberts has hurled 80 innings and struck out 92 batters while allowing just 49 hits and 11 walks. Harry Hamilton has had trouble with his control but the days he had it he was unbeatable. He has worked 63 innings, giving up 44 hits while walking 39 and striking out 50. Stan Henderson has been used sparing-

ly but when called upon, has been brilliant. In 18 innings he has allowed but five hits while walking seven and striking out 20. He will probably see lots of action in the coming series.

The Campbellville attack has been just about as average as usual. Last year they finished up with a team batting average of .322 and they go into the finals this year with a .318 mark. The big star on the attack has been Allan Wingrove who is having the best year with the bat ever enjoyed by a Campbellville player. The big question will be whether or not the team has lost their batting edge during their latest two week lay-off.
