Clerk McGeechie told members a list from the P.U.C. will be forthcoming naming all known infractors of the sewer lateral by-law.

Town Hall Condition

Councillor Barbeau reported briefly on investigations of the town hall's condition. A full committee meeting has not yet been held. Despite two scheduled, he said, all members have not yet shown up.

A letter from the solicitors for L. Veit, owner of a house at Mill and Wallace Streets, again wanted to know, since the town hasn't disclaimed responsibility, what will be done about drainage difficulties at this property. Council filed the letter, declaring no action would be made until some steps are taken by the owner to fix eavestrouthing on the house.

Council agreed to advertise notice of a Humane Society tag day here Friday night and Saturday.

Peter Dunham was appointed to the Library Board, following the resignation of M. Schroeder.

A letter from Robert Hudson Construction, Lakeview contractors, advised the firm would not make a decision on erecting a fence on Elizabeth Drive until the Brankiewicz hearing is completed. Council asserted the hearing has nothing to do with the erection of the fence and the contractors be notified of this.

Approval by form was read from the Department of Highways for the \$100,000 paving debenture by-law. (Estimated contractors' price accepted is \$104,000.)

It was noted by Council that R. V. Anderson, engineers, are to supply grades this week for leveling work on Lakeview roads.

The engineers and road committee are to make recommendations for erection of a guard rail at the end of Victoria St. near Fairy Lake.

Worry About Big Hole

Deputy-reve Wilson reported that Engineer K. Hyde believes drainage problems around Church Hill Road can be solved if water is run to highway culverts. This was discussed, as was the worrisome hole at the corner of Queen Street and Churchill Road. A letter is to go to builders Bradley and Houghlin, owners of the land with the depression, demanding measures to reduce the hazards around the hole partly filled with water.

Councillor C. Lindsay reported the United Suburban Gas Co. has laid conduit lines across the Marina bridge, contrary to the town's by-laws and without permission. He said small children have been seen walking across this pipe. A letter is to be sent ordering the pipe removed.

Councillor R. N. Brown noted a stop sign at Churchill Road in need of relocation.

Councillor S. Brunelle said the pumping manhole at Lakeview is being installed.
