Local Expansion Program by Bell Extends Phone Service Facilities

Telephone service is now available in almost any part of Acton as a result of a huge expansion of wire and cable facilities here. C. S. Keith, Bell Telephone manager for this region, said this week.

The expansion work was carried out recently on facilities serving the north and east sections of Acton.

It consisted of the laying of 1,750 feet of small underground "feeder" cable, connecting 455 "cable pairs"—each representing a telephone number—with the exchange, and constructing 2,550 feet of aerial cable along pole lines. In addition, a 600 foot extension was added to the conduit system on Main St.

The work not only made it possible to provide service for persons waiting for telephones but will also enable the company to provide for future applicants for some time to come. Mr. Keith pointed out that persons desiring additional telephones in frequently used rooms throughout their homes had merely to apply for them.

The construction job was the second major one carried out here within the last nine months and the third since the common battery exchange opened in 1949. At the end of 1955, Bell crews completed an extension of facilities throughout the exchange area and also added two additional positions to the switchboard in the exchange. They had added a switchboard position in 1953.

Mr. Keith said these extensions to telephone facilities were required to keep pace with the rapid residential and industrial growth of Acton. This growth is indicated by the fact that there are now more than 1,250 telephones in service here, compared with 820 just five years ago and 430 in 1945 when the post-war expansion period got underway.
