

### Halton Teachers Meet Friday Elect Officers

The annual convention of the Halton Teachers' Institute was held in the Lawrence Smith school, Burlington, on Friday, October 6, with president Elmer Smith of Acton presiding.

In his address, L. L. Skuce, inspector of public schools, mentioned that in September, 14,000 children were registered in Halton's elementary schools compared to 3,500 ten years ago.

R. H. Brayford of Hamilton Teachers' College addressed the group on "What the Lesson has to Contribute to Effective Teaching."

### Horticulture Topic Of Talk, Pictures

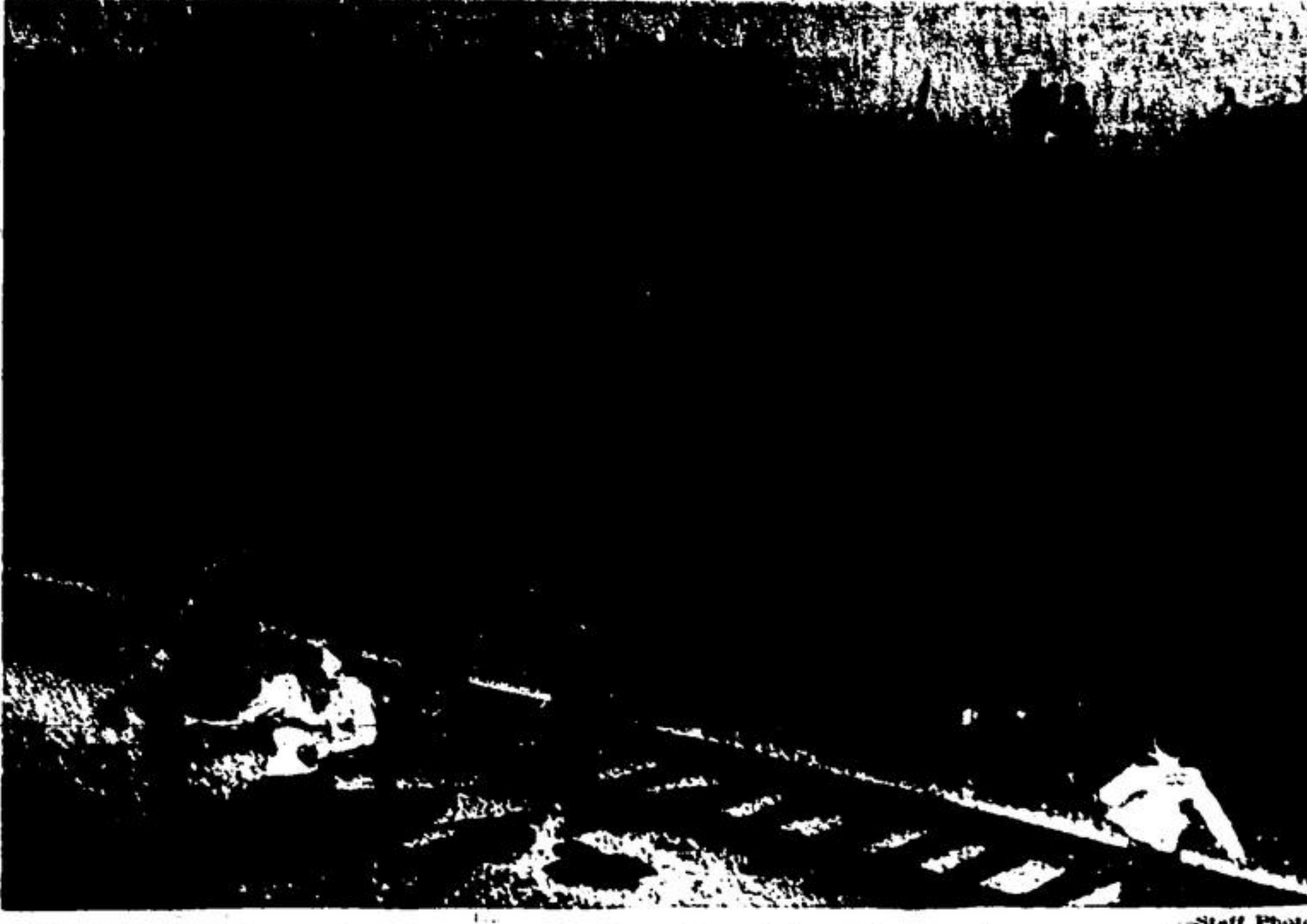

Street along the Fairy Lake bank. He also recommended the bank be built up. This is to be carried out by Engineer F. Pallenon reported time had not permitted work on the Glenlea culverts. This job is to be started as soon as current work in the lakeview is completed.

Council learned the United Suburban Gas Co. Ltd. had along a time alongside the Maria Street bridge on authority of the town engineer.

This had been done before council passed a resolution to order the line taken down. However, the engineer was asked to inform the company that the town will not accept the line in its present position as a permanent line.

Members heard a letter from Rayner Construction Co. Ltd., street paving contractors, to the architect seeking release from responsibility for possible cracks in pavement on streets where service excavations have recently been made. Council commented briefly, considered the same company had justified reason for seeking this release.

To Set Firm Gas Rates Notice was read of a hearing October 23 in Trafalgar Hall by the United Suburban Gas Co. to set permanent rates for the North and South Halton areas served, including Acton. Notice was also made of a North Halton Urban Board meeting next Wednesday in Milton.

A Main Street resident sought Council's help in providing driveway access to his house. Council considered this was the homeowner's problem.

Councillor S. Brunelle queried the position of R. V. Anderson engineers regarding road grade supervision in Lakeside. He was told that R. V. Anderson Associates prepared the plans but were not in charge of supervision.

Deputy Reeve W. Wilson charged that an engineer from this firm created the impression that some grades were wrong or altered wrong in Lakeside. This was found not to be so, he said. Here some argument developed over the motives of the Toronto engineer in allegedly making criticism of the town engineer's work.

The upshot of the argument was a near-unanimous vote of confidence in the town engineer. This was moved by Councillor W. Cook.

Drill for Water Beers International Water Supply Ltd. informed the town that it expected to start test drilling for more water here in about two or three weeks.

Council by-law authorized sale of a piece of property approximately 66 feet by 750 feet for \$750 to A. P. Green Firebrick Co. Ltd. This land stretches from the tracks to Wallace Street, immediately behind the company's present plant.

Polling subdivision problems, due to Acton's swelling growth, advanced a proposal from Clerk McGeechie that Ward One be broken up into two subdivisions. This was considered by council and accepted.

Councillor Cook asked when it was proposed to start work on the Mill north sidewalks, also raised a complaint about cars speeding near work areas on the town's roads. In this connection Mayor Tyler added town workmen should make more use of warning barricades when road work is in progress.

Councillor G. Barbeau referred to Acton's chronic parking problem on Mill Street. Several members considered that since merchants here were so disinclined to co-operate to reduce the parking difficulties, council shouldn't concern itself in attempts to help the businessmen.

In view of the continuing problem with unbroken cartons from the Mill Street area set out for garbage collection, members agreed to run a notice in the local paper drawing attention to the problem and seeking co-operation.

At the close of the meeting it was suggested a letter of commendation be sent the fire brigade for its response and action at last week's public school fire.
