Planning on a County basis was felt to be necessary by most representatives attending a joint meeting of the County Council and planning committee on Wednesday evening with representatives from most municipalities in the county present. A full report of the meeting is to be prepared and presented to County Council, and forwarded to all municipalities. It was decided that all municipalities were represented with the exception of Nassagaweya and Esqueping townships.

greatly in the assembly of all land use plans, road patterns and services," E. A. Gomme, Ontario Development, told the gathering. "With the major car changing rural areas into that of urban development, we should review these areas to come up with a satisfactory expansion program to follow."

**No Machinery**  
Deputy-reeve Fred Atkinson, Burlington, pointed out there was no machinery set up to establish planning boards in a county basis, but Mr. Gomme explained the Minister would favor the establishment of such, if all municipalities made application for such a board to be established.

William Mallocks, Acton, inquired who would be paying for this service, and Mr. Gomme said he felt the various municipalities could contribute to the cost of operation. Mr. Mallocks pointed out that County Council had asked for a grant to assist local planning boards but they had not yet seen fit to make such a contribution to a planning board.

**County Planner**  
Representing the Nelson Planning Board, John Goulding inquired if it was the intention of the county to establish a county planning board, while Don Bath, Treasurer, Chairman of the meeting, explained meetings had not yet got that far, but it seemed advisable "a county planner be engaged."

"Is it necessary for the county to spend money on a planner?" Mayor Ted Tyler, Acton, questioned. Especially when each municipality has been paying their own and each I am sure is receiving good service."

At this point, John Pearson, Ontario Department of Planning and Development, said he felt the next level of planning should be on a county basis.

**Urges Regional Group**  
R. Haslam, Burlington, urged the group to consider joining with the regional group, suggested by the Trade and Industry Branch, to assist with the problems, but representatives felt general planning came before the industrial expansion program. "We have to have proper industrial areas planned before we can attract industry," one representative said. Each of those present recognized the fact that all municipalities were eager to attract industry.

R. Small, Trafalgar, said he felt a county group should be set up to study planning. He was sure local planning boards which had been established over a period of years would be unwilling to give up their authority to another group. "Considerable study should be given to the program and good advice should be passed on to these planning boards already established," he said.

**Further Study**  
Deputy-reeve Fred Atkinson, Burlington, urged the planning committee to submit a report of the outcome of the last two meetings of the committee to county council. If council favored the report, it could then be forwarded to each of the municipalities in the county for further study. Mr. Pearson said it was necessary to do considerable "courting" with the two municipalities who were not represented at the meeting. "You may have to have another meeting, and the slower you go,
