Mrs. T. A. Brough Teacher Many Years

A native of this district who returned here less than a year ago from Vancouver, Janet Mitchell Brough passed away on Wednesday, October 11. She had been ill for a week at the home of her great-nephew, Charles H. Mitchell, R.R. 2, Campbellville.

Funeral service was held on Saturday, October 14 at the Rumley funeral home, Acton. Officiating minister was Rev. Gordon Baugh. Interment followed in Everton cemetery.

Palbearers were all great-nephews, James Chambers, Stoney Creek; Charles Mitchell, Campbellville; Lyle McCutcheon, Acton; George Fry, Barrie; John McCullum, Acton and George Sanders, Erin.

Mrs. Brough was born in Erasmoo township in 1872, the daughter of the late George Mitchell and Grace Idale Thomson Mitchell.

In 1926 she was married in Victoria, B.C., to Thomas A. Brough, who predeceased her. She lived in Vancouver 30 years before moving back east.

Mrs. Brough taught school for 28 years. After her marriage, her interest lay in teaching mission schools in Vancouver, especially among the British East Indians. Her spare time was spent in tutoring young people in the evenings, who were anxious to further their education.

She was a life member of the Women's Missionary Society and a member of St. David's Presbyterian church, Campbellville.

One son, seven sisters and two brothers all predeceased her.
