The meeting closed with singing "When You and I were Young" and a social time followed. Mrs. Earl Lambert passed on the appreciation to the hostess and committee.

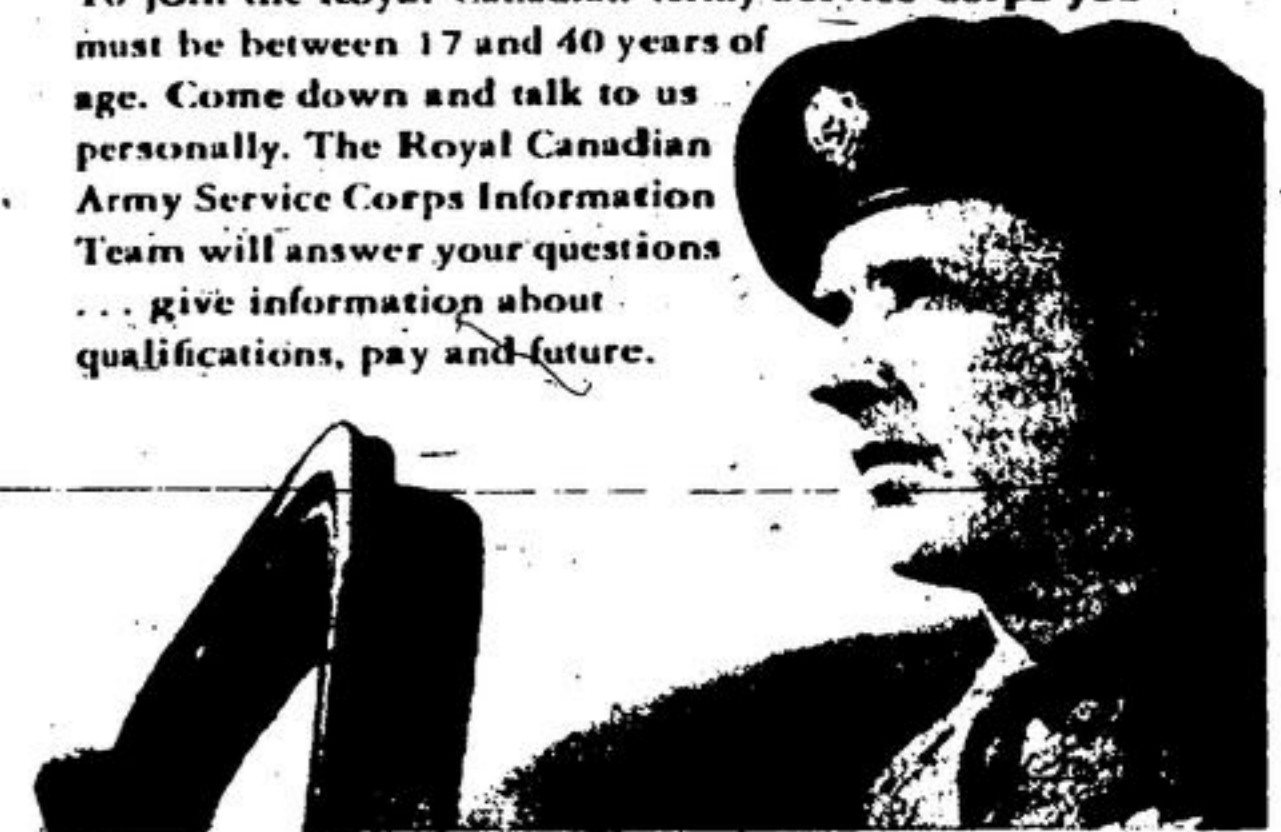

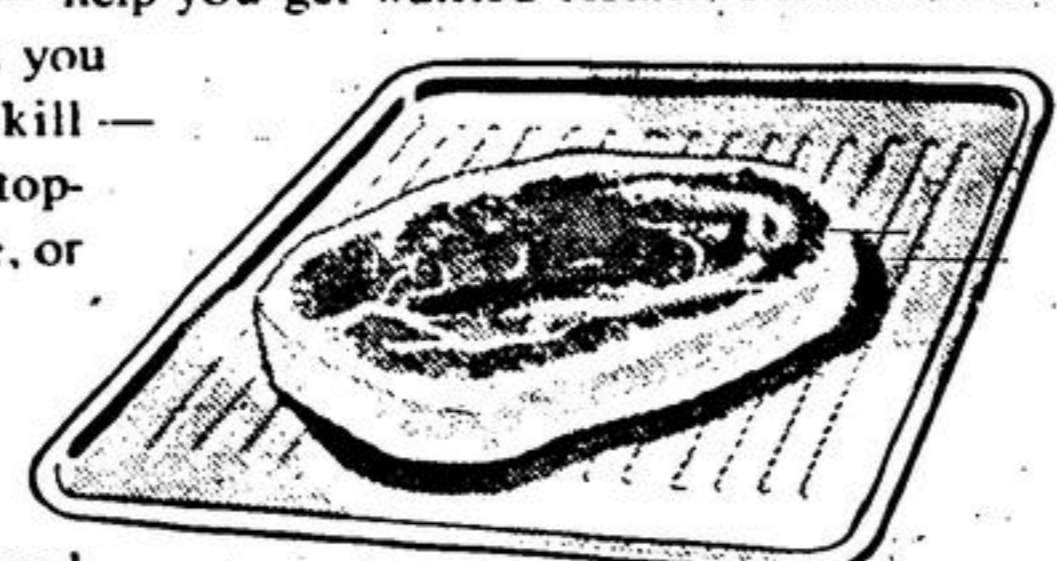
