East Flamboro OK's Burlington Annexation Try

BURLINGTON—East Flamboro council has voted unanimously in favor of supporting Burlington's application to annex part of East Flamboro.

The resolution held one stipulation, however, that the bounds of the proposed annexation area remain the same as they are now. If these limits were further increased or decreased, council would call for a further study into the subject.

The decision by council in favor of annexation followed on the heels of a public meeting. At the meeting, attended by about 300 Flamboro ratepayers, overwhelming support was given the move by Burlington.
