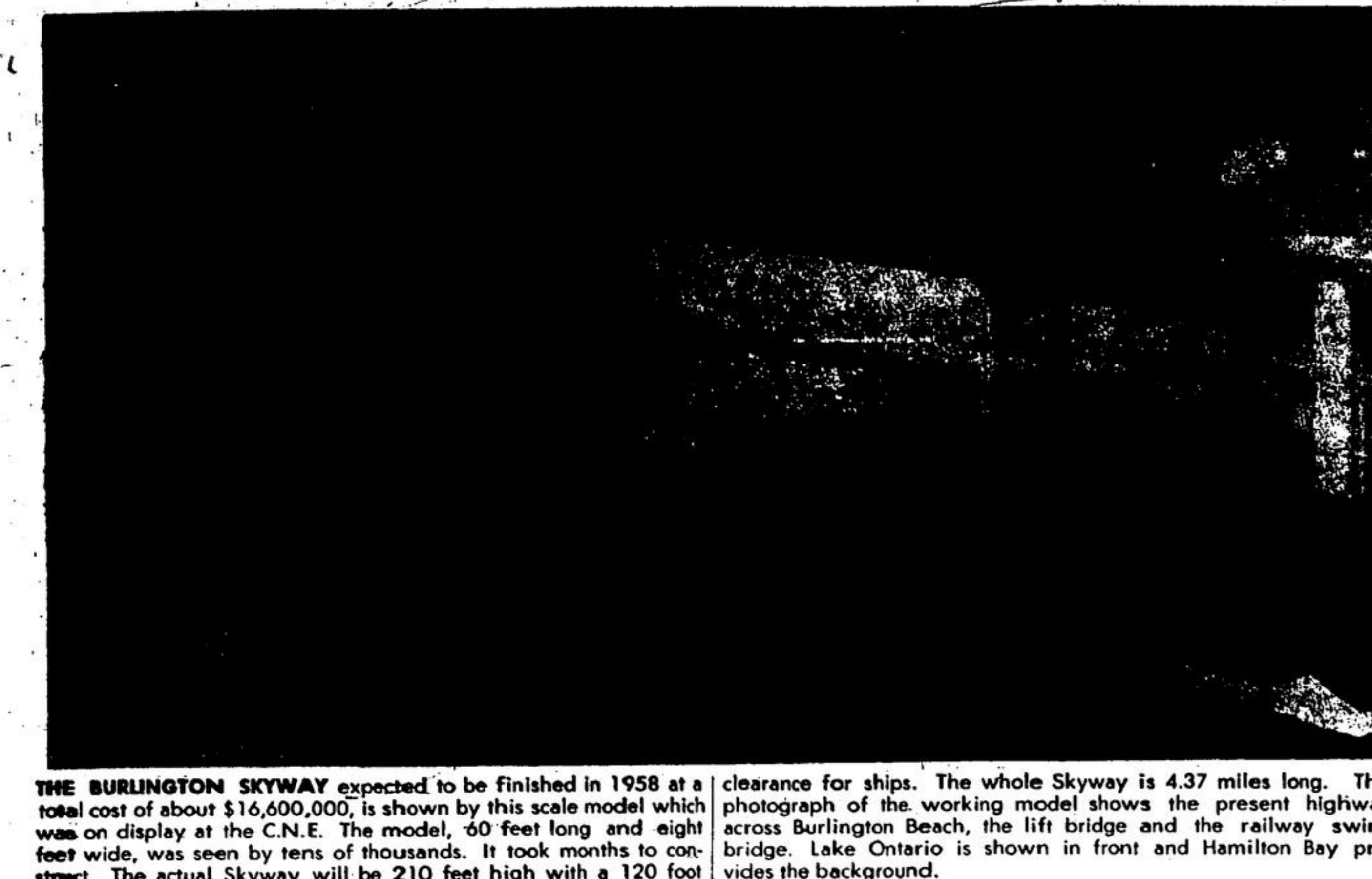

Many Town, Provincial Posts For Active Junior Mac Sprowl

Well known Halton Junior Farmer Mac Sprowl is the topic of a full article in the latest issue of Junior Farmer News. For his many friends who may not see the magazine, the article is reprinted here in full. Robert Meisack Sprowl, known to most people as Mac, one of the new members on the Provincial Executive this year, can boast of being a fourth generation member of one of Halton County's pioneer families. Mac's great grandparents came to Canada from Scotland and settled in the Acton area in 1820. The Sprowl's 165 acre farm is now located one quarter mile from Acton. 50 head of Shorthorns are kept on the farm. For five years Mac was a member of 4-H Inter-Club Clubs, taking part in the Inter-Club competitions at Guelph in 1947. He has also taken part in many Junior Farmer livestock and seed judging competitions. In 1951 he was a member of the Halton County team that placed third in the Junior Farmer Judging Competition at the Royal Winter Fair. In 1951, '52 and '53 he judged at the C.N.E. Junior Farmer competitions. Mac received his education at Bannockburn public school and Acton Continuation school. Not content with that he attended night school in Milton, where he studied Farm Machinery, Farm Business and Farm Management, Debating and Public Speaking. He has also taken two Short Courses at O.A.C.

New Directory Cover Drawing Of Huttonville

A drawing of the Credit River near Huttonville brings a regional scene of wide significance to the cover of the latest edition of the telephone directory, now being mailed to Milton telephone users. C. W. Harris, Bell Telephone manager here, said the cover illustration is the work of Canadian artist, Albert Cloutier A.R.C.A. The drawing replaces the figure of the "Spirit of Communication," which appeared on the front of local directories for several years. The new illustration is not the only change to be found in this year's directory, nor is it the most important. Some 1,270 new and changed listings are contained in the telephone book. For this reason Mr. Harris recommended that all Bell customers should discard last year's issue and start using the new one immediately. The Bell manager also urged telephone users to bring their "Blue Book of Telephone Numbers," or other personal lists up to date by comparing them with the new directory. "The blue books will come in useful for listing the local and the out-of-town numbers you call frequently," Mr. Harris said. He added the assurance that fresh copies of the blue books, regular and pocket size, are available on request at any Bell business office. The continuing expansion of this area is reflected in the increase in the number of telephone directories needed for distribution this year. Altogether, 14,140 copies are being delivered in the area covered by the book, as opposed to about 13,500 in 1955. The number of copies for distribution this year in Milton alone amounts to 2,600, compared with 2,300 last year.

Farms Supply Hosts To 65 at Churchill

Dairy Returns Normal Money Trickles in

Returns from the 1956 June advertising set-aside now amount to last year's \$192,000, according to Dairy Farmers of Canada, the first and only national farmers' group to be in advertising and promotion. Officials state that present returns are about normal for this time of year since it takes about six to eight months for the money to trickle in from dairy plants which make their deductions from farmers' cheques. Objective this year was \$400,000 but on the basis of present returns a final total of about \$380,000 is forecast. On the basis of a cent a pound butterfat on the amount of milk and cream marketed, the national potential for the set-aside last June was \$651,019.
