

District Cattlemen Win Jersey Honors

District cattlemen were recently awarded honors for Jersey breeds, announced by the Canadian Jersey Cattle club.

The Jersey cow, Lindale Lady Basilia -162620- has been awarded a 4,000 lb. certificate. In eight lactations, she produced 76,355 lbs. of milk and 4,056 lbs. of fat. Basilia is a daughter of the Superior Sire Brampton Pinnacle Basil -104635-. She has won before a Ton of Gold certificate and her classification is Very Good. Lindale Lady Basilia was bred and is owned by M. C. Besty of Milton.

A 4,000 lb. certificate has been awarded to the Jersey cow, Stant-onbrook Royal Laurena -145065-. In nine lactations, she produced 73,203 lbs. of milk and 4,228 lbs. of fat. Laurena was bred by S. V. Adams, Brampton, and is owned by George Hewer, Moffat. Her classification is Very Good.

G. F. Tompson First President Of Cancer Unit

G. F. Tompson of Milton was elected president of the North Halton Canadian Cancer Society at an organization meeting held in Georgetown.

Other officers are: secretary, Ernest Alcott, Georgetown. The positions of vice-president and treasurer are still open. Service committee, Miss Irene Mulholland, Mrs. Tom Grieve, Miss Grace Levey; education committee, Joyce Nesvit, Dr. A. E. McIntosh and Dr. C. V. Williams, both of Georgetown; campaign committee, Leslie Clark, Ted Tyler, Mrs. A. Taylor and Mrs. Day.

The meeting in the Legion Hall was sponsored by the Georgetown Lions club. The unit will serve the population from Highway 5 to the northern limits of Halton, including 25,000 persons.

A film, Man Alive, was shown, after which Dr. R. M. Taylor, Canadian Director of the Canadian Cancer Association, gave an outline of the basis of cancer research and told what had been accomplished. A question period followed.

Accept Tenders Of Isaac Sauve For Construction

The bids of Isaac Sauve to build culverts at lot 32, concessions 4 and 5, was accepted at a price of \$2,050, and at lots 10 and 11, concession 5, at a price of \$1,800 when Esquesing township council met in special session in the council chamber, Stewarttown, on September 18.

His tender for the construction of a new bridge at lot 2, concessions 5 and 6, was accepted by council on October 9. This was for \$10,000, extra concrete at \$60 per cubic yard, extra excavation at \$2.50 per cubic yard.

Construction was subject to the approval of the Department of Highways.

Mr. Sauve's tender on the third line bridge was returned following council meeting on October 1.

At this meeting, amounts paid for sheep destroyed included \$16 to Albert Presswood and \$4 to A. N. Stark. Paid and charged to the Esquesing Fire Area No. 1 were \$7.88 to Arthur Scott Motors and \$3.80 to Canadian Tire Corporation. Accounts for foxes paid included Newton Ruddle \$3, Chris Paulin \$3 and Bob Carey \$3.

Other accounts included: hospital accounts \$257.70; A. W. Benton \$10.80; Bell Telephone Co., \$16.40; Richardson's Hardware, \$4.50; Halton Registry Office, \$2.95; Municipal World Supplies and Exchange, \$2.83; M. Lawson, \$8; H.E.P.C., \$28.05; Halton Registry Office \$1.85; Georgetown Hydro Commission, \$116.25; charged to Esquesing Fire Area No. 1, treasurer, town of Georgetown, four fire calls, \$200.

Georgetown Hydro Commission was requested to install three street lights in the Korzack subdivision in Glen Williams under the direction of the township road superintendent.

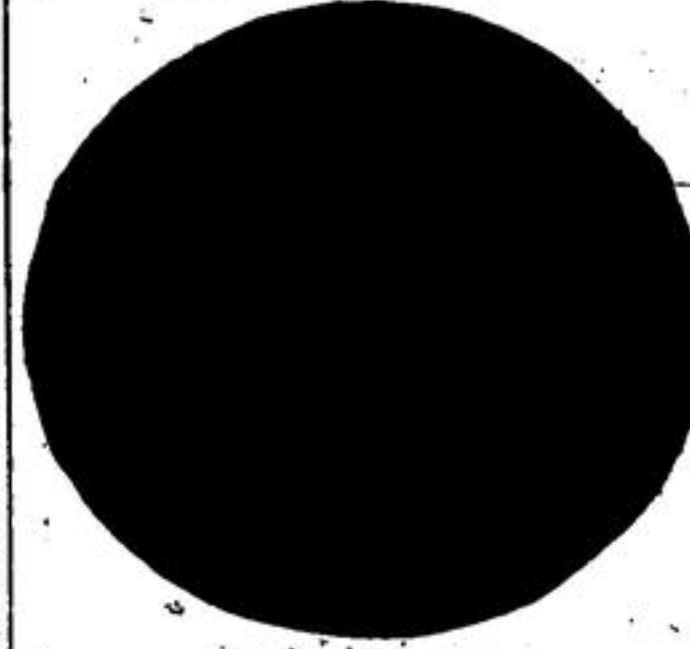
The tender cheque of Holman construction was returned.


