This increase would bring salaries up to the standards of jails in the province.

Application for permission to cross a county road was made by the Retractories Co. located near Bronte. Council decided it was a matter to be referred to both councils of Trafalgar and Bronte.

The chairman of the agricultural committee, A. R. Service, announced the county of Halton judging team had won top honors at the Royal Winter Fair. He said it was the youngest team ever to win from the county and their coach, Art Bennett, was to be congratulated. He announced his committee would be requiring an appropriation to provide recognition for the team.

Approve Jail Addition

Council gave the green light to the building committee to proceed with an addition to the jail at a cost of \$26,500, providing suitable grants can be arranged with the Department of Reform Institutions. Anderson Construction of Brampton was the successful bidder.

Officials of the United Suburban Gas Co. were present to present a bylaw to allow them to lay transmission lines on county roads, naming some 2,600 feet at Stewartstown.

Considerable discussion arose over the clarification of one clause which would permit the county to immediately repair a sunken trench and charge the company for the work to be done, also if the county would be liable for some expenses should a transmission have to be moved to another location at some future date.

When council wished to refer the by-law back to the road committee for further study and revision, John Evans, company solicitor, informed members subscribers in Stewartstown were now cold as gas was not available for their heating units.

Readings Given

"It's your fault you didn't bring this before council before now. I object to people charging in here and wanting to get things done in a hurry." R. H. Shannon, Burlington, stated.

Mr. Evans said his company was in the hands of council and was anxious for their advice. He further explained he could not return the by-law earlier as it was only last week approval was granted by the Fuel Board.

"I think this should go to the committee, to draft the by-law satisfactory to both parties. It is not our intention to block you," Warden Allen stated.

Dr. R. Buckner Takes Clergy on Wing Tour

Clergy of the town took a conducted tour of the Neuropsychiatric wing of the Ontario Reformatory at Guelph on Wednesday, November 7, as guests of Dr. R. D. Buckner. The program began with coffee and a briefing on the main purpose and what is being accomplished in the Neuropsychiatric wing.

In company with Dr. Buckner and the staff psychologists, the clergy had interviews with various inmates who had been helped immensely by treatment under the direction of Dr. Buckner. The young men who were interviewed and questioned gave a clear indication to the clergy that their attitudes to life were completely changed and that they would no longer return to the outside world with a healthy mental outlook on society. The clergy were impressed with their desire to serve society and the fact that they appeared to have the best interests of society at heart.

These inmates mentioned to the clergy that before being incarcerated, they hated authority, the police and all others who represented authority to them, but they now felt that this authority was constituted for their own welfare and for the welfare of society as a whole. Those interviewed by the clergy included a drug addict and a sex deviate.

The clergy were particularly impressed with the fact that some of the inmates give valuable assistance to Dr. Buckner and his staff in the treatment of their fellow inmates. One particular inmate impressed them considerably with the intense amount of satisfaction which he had derived from group therapy and other treatment offered by Dr. Buckner and his competent staff members.

Clergy were also shown the various tests conducted to establish patterns of behaviour and how inmates react to these various tests, including personality tests, talent tests and vocational guidance tests.

Dr. Buckner paid tribute to the Rev. W. O. Straw, the Chairman of the Ontario Reformatory, for the invaluable work he was doing, particularly in the rehabilitation of the prisoner after he has served his time and paid his debt to society. Dr. Buckner informed the clergy that he sincerely believed that the clergy should play a necessary part in rehabilitation. He felt that they should take over after the inmate had received psychiatric treatment and had been released back into society.

Following this fascinating and instructive tour, the clergy were served luncheon in the staff dining room.
