

# P.U.C. Reviews Proposed Contract With Electrical Workers' Union

in providing sufficient funds for adequate maintenance of the system.

Waterworks superintendent J. Lambert reported hydrant and main installation to the new public school had been completed and the season end work was progressing favorably.

Sewage superintendent A. Duby reported sewer flushing operations were progressing satisfactorily and had been made much easier since the paving because location of man holes was less difficult.

Arrangements for the employment of Colin Blair for the hydro crew were made with the final decision in advance pending completion of housing arrangements.

Hydro superintendent D. Mason reported street lights had been installed on Churchill Road south of No. 7 highway; pole brackets on order for Lakewood lights will be installed on arrival; a temporary power line was required by the new public school; and a pole on Cobble Hill would be moved as soon as possible, following a request from a resident in that area.

The commission also approved the hiring of temporary help and rebate of \$10 for a hot water heater damaged in delivery.

Overtime was also approved for meter reading and billing because of the heavy schedule of other work at the time the readings were required.

Dr. Onkes reported on an interview with a representative of the Ontario Labor Relations Board and the Commission upheld its earlier decision regarding the reinstatement of a former employee.

Just for the sake of comparison substitute Edmonton's ground-rushing Eskimos for Hamilton's Tiger Cats in last Saturday's game. Result?—Who would venture to say.

The Alouettes, again a powerhouse in the eastern league, are rated a better team than last to Edmonton last year. The Eskimos, according to their own admission, are a trifle weaker in some departments than last year's club.

**SPEAKING** on hockey last week, we made mention of the proximity of the game to Acton if fans wanted to see it. We neglected to mention, however, that the presence of Acton players on at least two of the neighboring teams will add interest to the games for Acton fans.
