

amount of water is available it would more than double the town

one acre site on the fourth line of Esquesing. A 24 hour pumping test began at 11 a.m. Tuesday and was still continuing Wednesday afternoon. Water pumped from the well was at the rate of 683 gallons a minute being lowered to the 641 range only because the pump motor became heated.

The pump, mounted on the 10-inch casing was operating at full capacity and drillers explained no larger pump would be necessary for further testing since data compiled would give officials the information necessary to determine the well's potential.

Drilling at the site has been underway since November 8 fellowing council's approval of testing not to exceed \$3,000. Municipal officials having realized the need for an additional water supply have been searching for about five years in an effort to develop a new

A preliminary report recommended a 1,000,000 gallon reservely as an addition to the system if a new water source could be developed, although no location has been considered pending location of the

Slightly over three miles of pipe would be required to pipe the water to the town system it has been estimated.

Present storage canacity of the town system is 250,000 gallous in various locations, with the output at the spring of 180 gallons a minute and at the well on north Main St. 80 gallons a minute.
