Ratepayers Name Ives Prexy Cancel Full Monthly Meetings

The civic nomination for public officers scheduled for Friday evening, November 23, was called to the attention of the membership and it was urged that members attend in force and support association candidate nominees.

The question of possible reassessment was raised because of the recent resignation of the town assessor. It was explained that assessment is necessary once yearly by law but that no immediate reassessment is probable.

Following the reading of the financial report which indicated a balance of \$80, there was a suggestion from the floor that a grant be made to the local Y.M.C.A. fund campaign. After deliberation, it was decided to leave the matter to the executive for investigation. Mr. Ives suggested that more could be accomplished by actively assisting in the drive rather than making a donation.

Funeral Cortage Includes M.P.'s As Halton Representative Interred

Sybil Bennett, Q.C., M.P., Halton's first lady member of parliament, who had represented the county at Ottawa since 1953, was buried in Greenwood cemetery, Georgetown, following funeral service in Milton Thursday, November 15.

The 100-car funeral cortage, including many members of parliament and county political figures, proceeded from St. Paul's United church in Milton by way of Acton. Burial followed a service in the church conducted by Rev. Morgan McFarlane, Georgetown, assisted by Rev. Lorne Graham, minister of the Milton church, and Rev. Eric Warren, Huttonville. During the service, in which Mr. McFarlane paid tribute to Miss Bennett as a vital, Christian woman who had served well her community and her country, Eleanor Schenk sang one of her favorite hymns, The King of Love, and funeral attendants another, Unto the Hills.

The church was filled with mourners, paying respect to one of Halton's best known residents, whose death at 52 cut short an active political career and ended the law firm of Dale and Bennett. Mr. Dale died a week earlier.

Active pallbearers were George E. Elliott, Q.C., Bruce Fitzgerald and Dr. Carl Martin of Milton; Sandy Best, Georgetown; Allan S. Nicholson, Burlington, and Beck Wilson, Meadowdale.

An impressive list of honorary pallbearers followed the casket from the church. These included,

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Increases in Loans Savings at B. of M.

Reflecting substantial increases in loans and personal savings, the Bank of Montreal's annual statement, for the year ended October 31, just issued, provides graphic evidence of the large part which this 139 year old institution plays in the financial life of the country, according to the B. of M.'s local manager.

At the same time, he said that the B. of M.'s shareholders' funds had been substantially enlarged by the addition of \$6,500,000 to the rest account or reserve fund. Earnings, likewise, increased moderately. Total resources, however, are at a slightly lower figure — \$2,783 million compared with \$2,796 million in 1955. Quickly available resources at \$1,427 million, represent 54 per cent of all public liabilities.

To meet the heavy demand for loans, the bank made a substantial reduction in its investment portfolio. Government and other public securities, not exceeding market value, stand at \$916 million — a contraction of \$298 million from the 1955 level.
