there is progressing and will be finished shortly.

**Lighting Improved**

The Elgin street lighting system has been improved with the co-operation of Boardman Co. New lighting has been installed on Main St. Rebuilt power lines were necessary on Churchill and Main Sts.

Currently, the financial account is satisfactory but it may vary because of the building program in progress, he said.

Dr. Oakes commented that there is need for more water and storage space and informed the gathering that council is in the process of seeking it. Rather than put new roads over old lines, it was deemed imperative to have repair lines before emergencies developed.

**Expend Deficit**

A deficit of approximately \$2,000 is anticipated in the waterworks instead of the customary surplus of about \$500, caused by the paving. In the sewer department, there is anticipated a deficit of \$8,000, but the effects of the new paving have to be taken into consideration.

Dr. Oakes suggested that a better balance of rate-structure would be most helpful in providing needed revenue in the water and sewer departments.

In the question period following presentation of Dr. Oakes' report, Arthur Ives questioned storage facilities when the new well is brought in. Dr. Oakes stated that council has considered the problem and Mayor Tyler mentioned that an engineer's report recommended 1,000,000 gallon storage facilities and that plans will be made when the well is located.

Roy Goodwin asked if industry gets a lower rate than residential, and, if not, are high rates keeping industry out of Acton. Town clerk J. McGonchie stated that industrial and residential rates are scaled and that any reduction in industrial rates would bring a proportionate increase in residential rates since present revenue was just carrying the system.

**Owls Hydro Power?**

H. Lowe questioned if it would be practical for Acton to generate its own hydro power. Dr. Oakes said the power generation would require a heavy debenture issue and most towns were purchasing power from Ontario Hydro.

The school board was the next committee to be heard from and its report was presented by Tom Watson. He reported that a 1955 survey indicated a need for additional classrooms so a building site was acquired. Plans were finalized for six new rooms at \$111,000 and construction started. Because of the school fire, plans were made to include an additional six rooms at a total cost of \$166,000 for the 12 rooms. The original six rooms will be ready by Easter. The final six rooms are still subject to approval of the Ontario Municipal Board.

Mr. Watson paid tribute to Mr. Mann, who returned from his caretaker duties because of poor health after over 25 years of service.

**County Roads Improved**

J. Hargrave reported on the building of the new registry office and the addition to the county jail. He also commented on the county road situation, noting that the roads in the north of the county are in the best shape they have been for many years.

According to William Wilson, candidate for the deputy-reeve,

ship, Acton has made great strides forward in the last half dozen years. He stated that credit must be given to the civic leaders over those years for their foresight and accomplishments. The citizens of Acton are also deserving of praise for their co-operation in helping the town progress.

Mr. Wilson praised the Chamber of Commerce and Industrial committee for their efforts on behalf of Acton. He also mentioned the county hospital plan, noting that the hospital in Guelph should be adequate and if one is located in the immediate area, we may be paying for something we won't use.

In closing, Mr. Wilson again congratulated the people and council for a job "well done."

## BACK THE ATTACK ON TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS

"Beginning December 1, all across Canada and the United States," Mayor Ted Tyler announced today, "The broadest campaign ever attempted to reduce the number of accidents on our streets and highways will be launched. The campaign is appropriately called, 'Back the Attack on Traffic Accidents.'"
