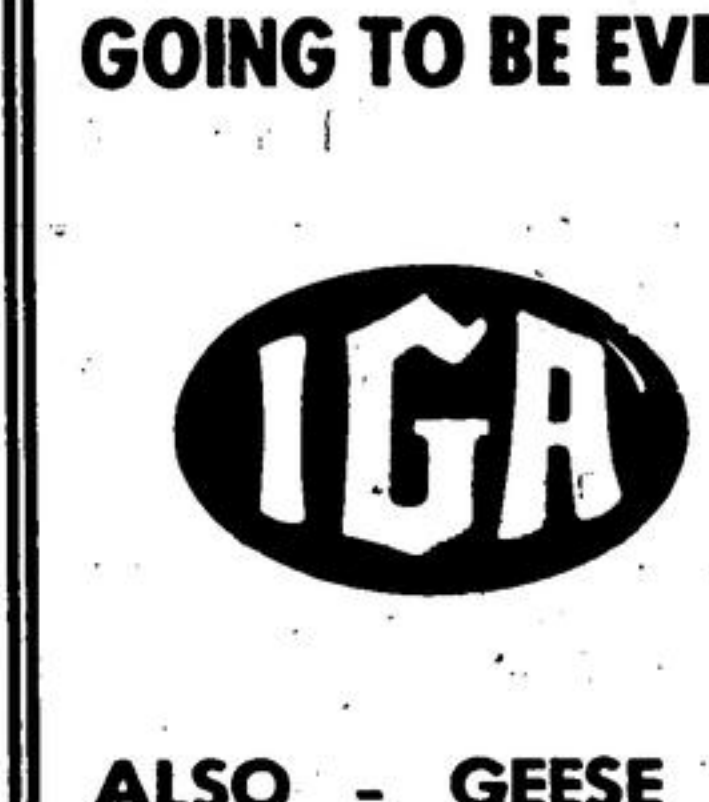
Teen-Agers

Pigeons Drop in Two Ways, Then Council Fears

BRAMPTON—Councillor Walter Misener brought to the attention of his fellow members the question of pigeons on the post office and other buildings in Brampton.
 In the downtown section, between eight and nine of a morning, "walking along the sidewalk is anything but fine for citizens," Mr. Misener commented. The question of pigeons overhead meant something of a nuisance for people below, he suggested.
 Mayor Nance Horwood commented some of the pigeons had already been shot, in fact one woman had been "badly frightened by a dead pigeon suddenly dropping at her feet. Mrs. Horwood pointed out there was a law against shooting of pigeons.

Various remedies were suggested by sympathetic council members. Deputy-reeve Fred Kline said the problem had occurred at Grace United church. "All we had to do was put three or four imitation snakes on the ledges of the steeple." ("And they all came to St. Paul's," interjected the mayor.) Councillor Jack Pawley suggested red pepper. Reeve Core understood there was available some substance which could be put on the edge of the buildings with a caulking gun.

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PUC to Build Garage, Building Despite Municipal Centre Veto

TRAFALGAR—Though Trafalgar electors turned down a proposed \$266,000 municipal centre on the Seventh Line, Public Utilities Commission chairman Gordon Leaver said that tenders for a 20-car garage and administration building to cost \$12,000, would be called early in January.
 After the eight-vote defeat of the municipal centre by-law, deputy-reeve Alec Phillips hinted that the Municipal Board might be asked to hold a hearing on the by-law which was voted down 794-786.
 P.U.C. chairman Leaver said that tenders for the Utilities buildings would have been called "six weeks ago", but in order to have the buildings blend with the proposed municipal office building, the architect had presided at joint council-P.U.C. meetings.

"But the P.U.C. agreed to buy five of the 22 acres the council has purchased on the Seventh Line about 2000 feet south of the present township hall," said Mr. Leaver. "So our buildings will be started on the northerly portion of the site before spring. At that, we don't expect to have them completed before next fall."
 It was the northern voters who defeated the proposed municipal building, which was to take shape south of the five-acre P.U.C. site. The vote was: for ward 1, for 19, against 44; ward 2, for 79, against 125; ward 3, for 234, against 229; ward 4, for 118, against 102; ward 5, for 336, against 264.

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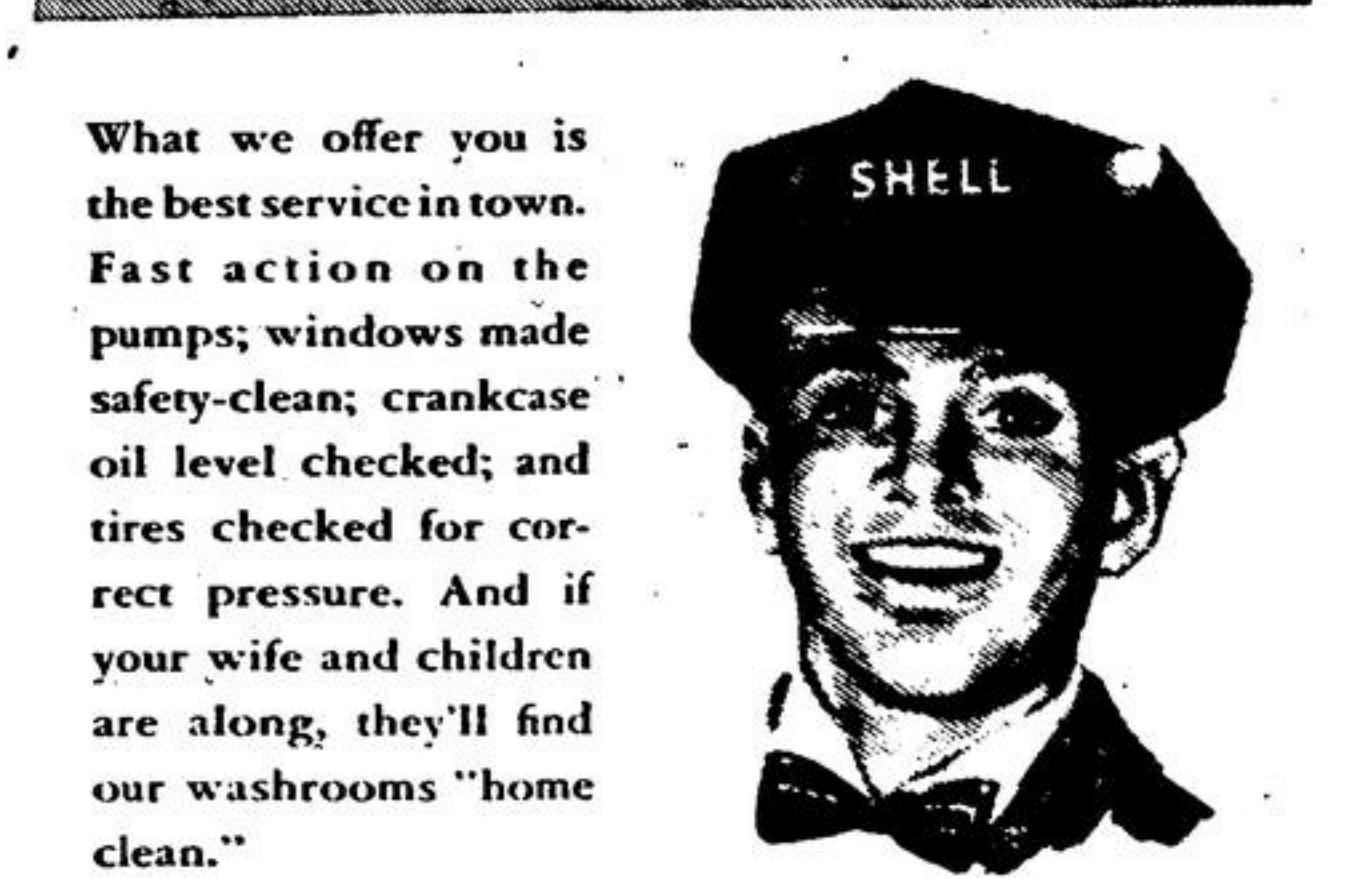
