All Time High Cubbing Reflects Growth

Cubbing for 1956 proved to be again a most successful year for the boys in Acton.

During the year 56 boys between the ages of eight and 12 participated in regular weekly meetings in the Scout Hall.

Both "A" and "B" cub packs carried on under the leadership of cubmaster Murray Seyvne (Akela) ably assisted with "B" pack on Tuesday nights by Miss Doris Allan (Raksha) and with "A" pack on Thursday nights by Mrs. Eileen Wensley (Baloo), Mr. Ron Smith and Mr. Doug Tarrant.

Commencing again in September both packs were filled to capacity and over 28 boys had to be placed on a waiting list until more leadership was found to form a new and third cub pack. Volunteers answered the appeal for leaders and early in November the new pack was formed under the leadership of Mr. Ray Costerus assisted by Mr. Doug Tarrant (Baloo). Combined with the "Going Up" ceremony in which 14 cubs went up to scouts, the waiting list was eliminated temporarily. Since that time more boys have applied for membership but have had to be held back until 1957.

Also at this time "A" pack was taken over by Eileen Wensley as cubmaster and assisted by Messrs. Ron Smith (Baloo), Robert Foyers and Doug Hardy. The Tuesday night pack remained under the same leadership with one new assistant, Mr. Lorne Youngblut, (Bagheera).

At the end of 1956 Acton is now stronger in cubbing activities than it has ever been before. "A" and "B" packs have 28 boys in each and the new "C" pack has 18, most of whom are now invested and on their way through the test work that lies ahead.

Excellent View For Spectators

By-Law No. 26-56.

WHEREAS under Subsection 911 of Section 243, R.S.O. 1950, as amended in 1956, the power to issue trailers is conferred on the Councils of local Municipalities, AND WHEREAS it is deemed necessary and desirable to charge a license fee for trailers which are used for living accommodation in the Township of Esquewaug, NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF ESQUEWAUG ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. In this By-Law, trailers shall mean trailer, cabin-trailer, trailer-coach, or any other form of portable dwelling, which is not assessable under Chapter 24, R.S.O. 1950, as amended from time to time.

2. Any person using a trailer, cabin trailer, trailer-coach, or other form of portable dwelling for living, sleeping and eating accommodation of persons for a longer period than thirty days, shall first obtain a license from the Clerk of the Municipality so to do.

3. The fee for such license shall be ten dollars (\$10.00) for each calendar month, or portion thereof, and shall be payable in advance.

4. The owner of proof that a license has been taken out shall be on the occupant of a trailer, and the Building Inspector of the Municipality, or any police officer may, at any reasonable time, demand the production of such license and in the absence of a paid stamp for

the current month, the occupant shall be deemed to have contravened the provisions of this By-Law.

5. This By-Law shall apply to all trailers, cabin-trailers, trailer-coaches and other forms of portable dwellings which are used for the living, sleeping and eating accommodation of persons, whether or not they were assessed before the passing of this By-Law, but shall not apply to trailers which are parked in the townships for sale or storage.

6. Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this By-Law shall be liable upon conviction, to a penalty of not less than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) nor more than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) exclusive of costs, in addition to all license fees in arrears.

7. By-Law No. 10-54 of the Township of Esquewaug is hereby rescinded.

8. This By-Law shall come into force upon the first day of January, 1957, and shall remain in force from year to year until amended or rescinded.

Read a first and second time this 10th day of November, A.D. 1956.

Read a third time and passed this 15th day of December, A.D. 1956.
