

Pants Reach Pole Minus Their Wearer

WINNIPEG (CP) — A pair of pants lost 60 years ago when explorers were racing against time and each other to reach the North Pole, may have beaten everyone to the target.

Rear Admiral Donald B. MacMillan, 62, of Provincetown, Mass., a survivor of the Peary expedition to the North Pole in 1907, told the story of Louis Noror's pants while visiting Winnipeg.

Noror was a crew member aboard the ill-fated Jeannette, which attempted to reach the North Pole with the aid of ice floes. The floes originated in St. Lawrence and moved toward the polar region.

So the Jeannette lodged itself in the ice and waited. But ice floes crushed the ship before its objective had been reached and the crew were forced to jump overboard.

Noror threw his belongings over and jumped. Admiral MacMillan said. But in his exodus to the ice, he lost his pants, which had his name sewn in them.

Years later, the pants were found by someone on the other side of the world.

Admiral MacMillan did not reach the Pole when Robert E. Peary first achieved it in 1909, because his feet froze while leading one of the sleds.

At 60 he married and his wife, Miriam, has made nine trips with him to the Arctic. Next June they plan to head for the Arctic again on their ship, the Bowdoin.

Will Investigate Forming Credit Union For County

About 50 members of the Halton Federation of Agriculture, at the annual meeting which was held in the afternoon at the office of the Federation, took steps toward the establishment of a credit union in this area.

The speaker explained that in 1941 one of the first Credit Unions was formed in this district, and one year after its start, a charter was received. At the end of the first year, there was \$800 in the Union and about \$2,400 had been loaned.

The territory the Union covered soon spread, office space was secured, and in three or four years the company had about 10,000 assets. After the establishment of a checking service, the assets were doubled.

Total assets now, he explained, were over \$700,000, and about 200 new members were being welcomed each year. Mr. McCutcheon explained that about 15 members can start the organization, which he termed "a group of people that have a common bond, who agree to pool their financial resources and give each member two or three times the use of his money."

Jack Taylor of R.R. 2, Burlington, was named 1957 president, to succeed R. L. Davidson of Acton, who has served in that position for two years. Mr. Davidson takes the position of honorary president.

First vice-president, third and fourth vice-presidents are Bob Laking of Moffat, Mac Sprowl of Acton, Ed Edwards of Acton, and Bill Malphize of Acton.

A motion to support the county weed control program and have the weed inspector spend more time on the job, even if it costs more, was carried.

Also carried was a plea for closer inspection of all premises where dairy products are produced and shipped.

It was suggested closer supervision of labelling and marking of meat products be asked, to increase the quality and help encourage the consumption of home products. It was pointed out that this was already in effect.

Two other motions, one regarding proper labelling of Canadian products, the other concerning the merging of many farm organizations into one large club with different divisions, were tabled for further consideration.

Two special guests were present for the annual meeting. Floyd Griehack, secretary of the National Farm Radio Forum, conducted the discussion period following the forum broadcast on "The Role of the Delegate." He brought with him Wyatt Bryce of Jamaica, assistant secretary of information and publications of the Jamaica Agricultural Society, British West Indies.

Mr. Bryce is here on an international co-operation administration fellowship in connection with his work, and has spent considerable time studying Canadian farming.

Typical of the present methods of presentation to the annual general meetings of the federation, but all favored increasing the Canadian Federation's budget sufficiently to finance a larger delegation to the annual C.E.A. meeting. Most favored increasing the number of delegates from the present 27 to 100.

Members also favored the suggestion that delegates to the C.F.A. convention be chosen by special district or area organizations.

The secretary's financial report showed a balance on hand of over \$1,000.

Mac Sprowl made a plea for financial assistance to the Ontario Federation, who last year operated on a \$7,000 deficit. He warned that if the organization keeps on this way, the provincial program will have to be geared down a little. He reminded members that Halton last year came to their aid with \$200 over and above the regular \$1,119.25. Members made no definite commitments.

A. R. Service urged members to support the Hog Producers' drive to have 100 per cent of the hogs marketed through the stock yards instead of direct.

It was recommended that secretary A. R. Couler be given a salary, that R. L. Davidson conduct the first half of the meeting. After the announcement of new officers, 1957 president Jack Taylor took over. At the close, the ladies served a light lunch.
