"Grass roots ecumenicity" was a phrase that echoed through the recent sessions of the Canadian Council of Churches held in Kitchener. Out there, men and women of many denominations, busy in every day dress and clergy in episcopal and mediatorial purple rubbed shoulders.

One of the highlights of the Conference was much soul-searching by these leaders on "wastefulness and competition." The C.C.C. 16 page report presented that "the churches are inclined to cooperate only where necessary."

Hailed by the press as a step forward in Christian unity, many reporters forgot to point out that there is an area of Christian edification that has been cultivated and proven fruitful for over 150 years. This area is that of evangelistic and missionary enterprise through the circulation of the Scriptures by the Bible Societies. No wastefulness or competition exists in this sphere and Christian unity of purpose and service have been tried and proven successful.

For a century and a half, thousands of branches of the Bible Societies have had their officers drawn from scores of denominations and have contributed to the collective world wide work of the Universal Church and at a fraction of the cost otherwise involved.
