Veterinarian Finds Pet Dogs Will Bite

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Life wouldn't be so complicated for Dr. J. H. Furneaux if his patients didn't try to put the bite on him. Dr. Furneaux figures he's become about the most dog-bitten man in Newfoundland since he hung up his veterinarian's shingle in St. John's 20 years ago. Most of his early years were spent doctoring horses, then the chief means of transportation in St. John's. Now dogs and cats and the occasional budgie bird are his chief concerns, but he has also ministered to ailing monkeys, cows, canaries and one bear. Dr. Furneaux breeds and sells dogs as well as treating them, and passes on a few tips on their care and training: Ten or 15 minutes a day is enough to train any thoroughbred to perform tricks and obey; dogs should be dewormed at least once a year; fed a balanced diet once a day; inoculated against distemper and a good news for the pooches, washed only once a month. If they are washed too often, natural body oil will disappear and with it the natural sheen of a dog's coat. And if the pup's ailing, treat him carefully. Dogs often have mean dispositions when they're feeling off-color, and Dr. Furneaux has the scars to prove it. His most obvious one is on his upper lip—he got it in a tangle with a cocker spaniel.

Alaska Hunter Saved by RCAF

WHITEHORSE, V. T. (CP) — A letter from a Haines, Alaska farmer thanking an R.C.A.F. crew for rescuing him after he was mauled by a bear was published in the weekly Whitehorse Star. Forest H. Young Jr. said he was attacked by the bear while in the Chilkat river country in Alaska, near the Canadian border. Critically injured, he lay in the woods for 12 hours while his partner went after help. Mr. Young writes: "The mere saving of my life is relatively unimportant perhaps, but the significance of the act under present world conditions is outstanding," Mr. Young says. "When a neighboring nation, like friendly and compassionate neighbors at the local level, can with impunity disregard national boundaries and jump in to relieve and alleviate the distress of another national, I think we all have something very special for which we can be thankful."
