J. J. Stewart '57 Commission Chairman Review Meter Reading at Inaugural

Meter reading and discussion of previous business occupied most of the inaugural meeting of the Acton Public Utilities Commission Thursday when Commissioner J. J. Stewart was named chairman with R. Everdell as vice chairman. Members of the Commission present for the inaugural were J. J. Stewart, R. Everdell, E. Hufnagel, W. Kelley and Mayor E. Tyler. The problem of water meters with excessive readings was reviewed in a discussion of business arising out of the minutes. At the last meeting, two such readings had been discussed with one reading being disallowed. Commissioner Kelley questioned why the one reading was disallowed and his reading upheld. A resolution approved the writing off of \$48.43 because of the poor meter location in the Bower Ave house. It was reported plans were being made to make easier access to the meter. Secretary J. McGeachie objected to Commissioner Kelley's suggestion it was the job of the office to use meters were and he continued pointing out Mr. Kelley had been notified of the Commission's decision to uphold the reading on his meter and had paid \$10 on account.

Questioned by the chairman, Mr. Kelley explained he planned to make the payments monthly until a decision is made to make a refund. Discussion continued over planned changes in meter reading to eliminate the necessity of "guess readings" when access to the meter is not possible. Mayor Tyler suggested the meter be read this month, removed and checked. It was suggested if the meter checked alright the reading be reinstated. Objection was made to this suggestion that since the high reading the meter had been checked in its initial checking. Reviewing meter readings on the Kelley home over previous months, the Commission noted "guess readings" had been applied which was explained as due to the inaccessibility of the meter. The situation was finally resolved in approval that the reading be made and the meter removed and checked prior to further discussion. Commission members agreed to begin review of the agreement proposed by the United Brotherhood of Electrical Workers covering the hydro employees. Following review by the Commission, negotiations postponed at Commission request toward the close of the year will be continued. Mayor Tyler asked early council consideration toward the formulation of a street lighting improvement program. He noted the town had attractive lighting planned or completed in the subdivisions and the program should be continued in other sections of the town. Lengthy discussion followed Secretary McGeachie's suggestion that meter reading be started earlier to insure completion of the readings in time for billing by the 10th of the month. The three superintendents pointed to numerous back calls since access to many houses was not available. Finally discussion involved no back calls would be made, meter cards would be left and if not returned in three days, the maximum bill based on the previous year would be rendered. Commissioner Kelley drew attention to the report of the Magistrate, published by the Commission, following a recent dispute over alleged discrimination. He challenged members to recall whether he had ever demanded a \$300 raise, as the report suggested. Discussion resumed over the situation whether it was \$300 or \$300; whether Mr. Kelley had resigned or was still employed when the salary raise was discussed; why it was

put in the paper when the Commission knew it was wrong. Commissioner Everdell concluded that if Mr. Kelley objected to the contents of the report, he should object to the Magistrate who wrote it. Mr. Kelley noted it would like a complete report of the contents of the report, including legal expenses and legal costs. Mr. Kelley pointed out all accounts were regularly published. Hydro superintendent Mason reported his department was training trees and asked if further help was planned for that department that would allow work ends off. The engaging of additional help was delayed pending completion of progress on negotiations with the Union. Waterworks superintendent Lambert reported he was repairing meters and assured members a reported leak on Church St. would be looked after. The difficulty of obtaining a compressor was pointed out and the secretary was instructed to obtain pipes. Sewer superintendent Dudy suggested there was little cause for concern of the variance in water pumped and that treated in the disposal plant. He gave several possible causes for this. He reported repairs to a valve in the system would be made shortly. Arrangements were suggested to allow the waterworks and sewer superintendents alternate week ends off. Accept Resignation From Malvin Grant

Among the motions carried was the power to appoint officials and fix their remuneration, to authorize the reeve and treasurer to borrow from the bank a sum not exceeding \$50,000, and that the by-law asking for requisitions of Police village and Council Boards be presented to Council on or before March 1, 1957. The resignation of Malvin Grant as representative on the Petrolia District High School Board was accepted with regret. Mr. Grant said that owing to ill health, he was unable to continue in the position. Two new members to the Council were welcomed by the Reeve at the meeting. There was a full state of members present. The Reeve was authorized to apply to Department of Highways for balance of the subsidy for 1956 road capitalization. Fire insurance with Firestone Mutual Fire Insurance Co. was renewed on existing policy as follows: building, \$4,000; contents, \$1,000. Burglary insurance was renewed with the John Henderson agency. Council gave approval to the Petrolia District High School Board to increase the present budget for 1957-58. Council decided it was prepared to pay \$1.00 per hour for part time jobs for book-keepers in the Township. Deputy Reeve E. H. Benham was appointed representative on the Grand Valley Conservation Authority for 1957.
