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Ford-Oakville Sets New Safety Records

OAKVILLE—The Ford-Oakville plant has set three new industrial safety records in chalking up 1,600,000 accident-free hours Tuesday of last week.

Oakville plant manager William D. Walker accepted an award certificate from R. G. D. Anderson, general manager of the Industrial Accident Prevention Association, Tuesday.

The award certified that Ford workers had worked 1,600,000 man-hours without a lost time accident between November 13 and December 31.

Ford-Oakville employees had set a new record for the automotive industry, attaining 1,422,334 accident-free hours.

Tuesday at noon saw the plant mark up the 1,600,000th safe hour to set a new record in the I.A.P.A. Category 11, which includes metal trades and farm implement plants as well. The previous record was 1,400,000 set by Canadian Car and Foundry.

In presenting the certificate, Mr. Anderson congratulated the men and said: "We are delighted that this newest Ford of Canada industrial plant has become the first to achieve this notable safety record. It is a challenge to other plants to strive for similar safe practices."
