Georgetown Bid For Hospital Alters Report

Georgetown Hospital Association met with Dr. Harvey Agnew and Mr. Ferguson, representing the firm of Agnew, Craig and Peckham, hospital consultants of Toronto, to go into details of the report as submitted to the Halton County Council last September. Advice had been sought to ascertain what hospital facilities would be needed to give adequate service to the county.

Need for a hospital in Georgetown was discounted in their report. Members of the hospital committee contend that the report did not give a true picture of either population requirements or financial aspects. It was pointed out to the consultants there was no prejudice against Milbank, they shut out Middle Jumper. Eskimos also figured in a shut out, their victim being the Frogs. Top timber tyroper was G. Booth with 208. Also making the spotlight were B. Skidmore 675, D. Martin 683, T. Davison 612, D. Daith 624, D. Green 664, R. Morton 601, J. Bullough 657, H. Earle 699.

The letter in quaint English reads:

Omoto karsan Atake eite
Kyoto to Japan
December 22, 1956

Dear Sir,
Now that Christmas is just around the corner, I extend to you my heartfelt greetings for the Yule tide. Today world situation is running to dangerous zone, problem of سوریا (Syria) conflict of Israel and Egypt and the rebellion of Islam.

Major John Armstrong produced government statistics to show that alone Georgetown was the focal centre of a present population of 12,000. On the basis of 5.5 beds per thousand, this would warrant a hospital of 60 beds. This figure is borne out by the findings of the Gordon A. Friesen Associates, hospital consultants of Toronto, in their report submitted to the Georgetown Hospital Association in 1956.

The Friesen Consultants estimated the number of beds would need to be doubled in five years and nearly tripled in ten years.

Population of Georgetown in the last year rose from 3,000 to 6,280.

Reverend Stan Allen expressed the opinion the report as submitted could not be accepted and asked that the section of the report restricting the Georgetown Hospital Association from campaigning for funds and appeals to municipalities and the government be deleted. Also requested to be deleted was the previous paragraph in the report which recommended that the County Council did not endorse construction of a public hospital in Georgetown.

Dr. Alvarus MacIntosh spoke on behalf of the "Yankee doctors" in Georgetown and supported the deletion from the medical plan.
