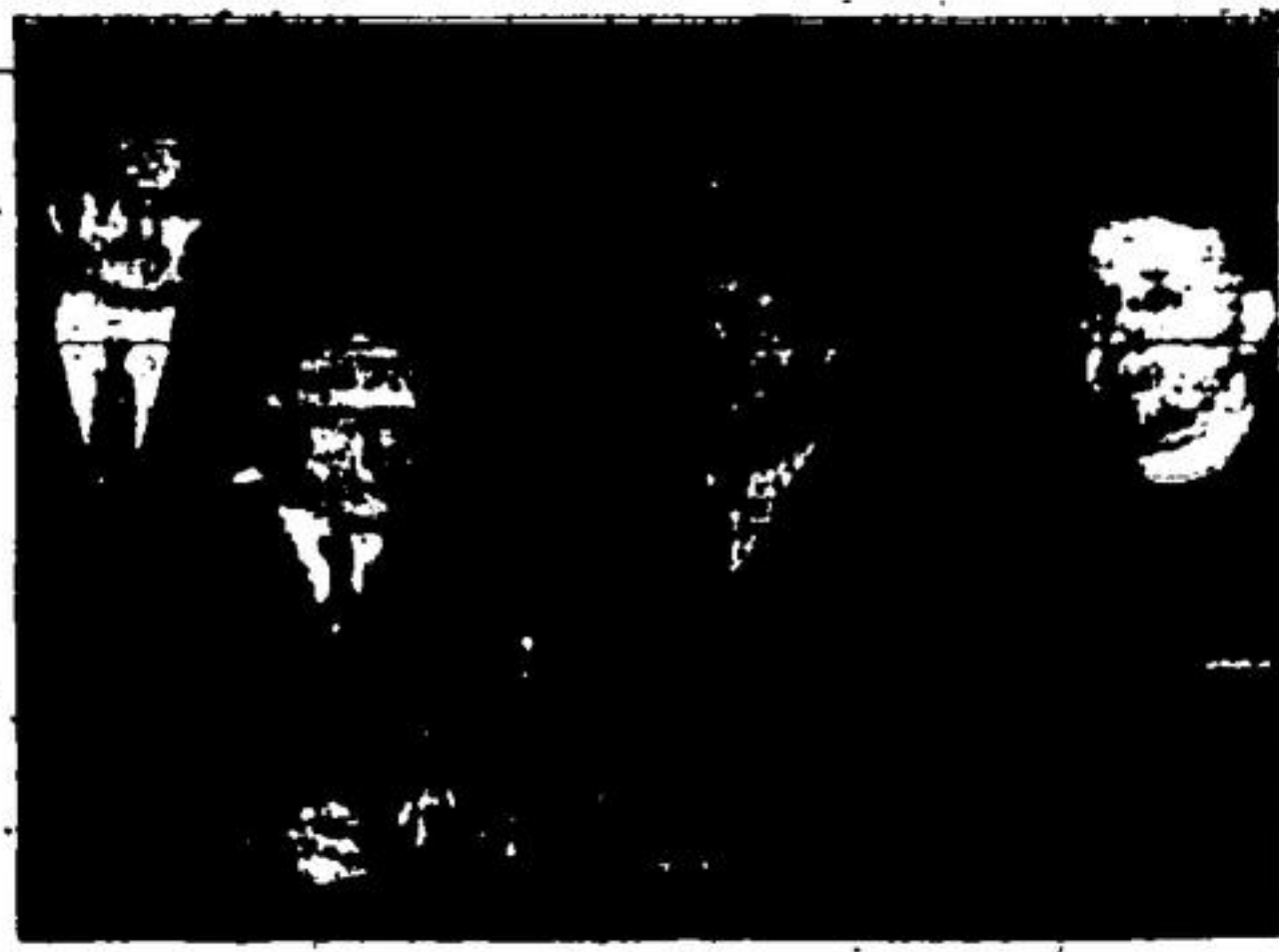

Georgetown Bid For Hospital Alters Report

Georgetown Hospital Association met with Dr. Harvey Agnew and Mr. Ferguson, representing the firm of Agnew, Craig and Peckham, hospital consultants of Toronto to go into details of the report as submitted to the Halton County Council last September. Advice had been sought to ascertain what hospital facilities would be needed to give adequate service to the county.

Next for a hospital in Georgetown was discussed in this report. Members of the hospital committee concluded that the report did not give a true picture of either population requirements or financial aspects. It was pointed out to the consultants there was no prejudice against Milton having a hospital but the facts from all standpoints supported Georgetown.

Mass. John Armstrong produced government statistics to show that alone Georgetown was the focal centre of a present population of 12,000. On the basis of 55 beds per thousand, this would warrant a hospital of 66 beds. This figure is borne out by the findings of the Gordon A. Ferguson Associates' hospital consultants of Toronto, in their report submitted to the Georgetown Hospital Association in 1956.

The Ferguson Consultants estimated the number of beds would need to be doubled in five years and nearly tripled in ten years.

Population of Georgetown in the last year rose from 5,000 to 6,200.

Hebe Stain Allen expressed the opinion the report as submitted could not be accepted and asked that the section of the report restricting the Georgetown Hospital Association from campaigning for funds and appeals to municipalities and the government be deleted. Also requested to be deleted was the previous paragraph in the report which recommended that the County Council did not endorse construction of a public hospital in Georgetown.

Dr. Allan Macintosh spoke in behalf of the seven doctors in Georgetown and expressed dissatisfaction from the medical fraternity. In reply to the many criticisms Dr. Agnew said he had tried to be just in the appraisal of the situation and was not opposed to a hospital in Georgetown. He said there would be a hospital in Georgetown but could not say when.

Dr. Agnew agreed to submit addendum to his report to state that a hospital should be built in Georgetown and completed in three years time. He further agreed to submit that the same financial assistance be forthcoming to the Georgetown Hospital as to the Milton Hospital.
