Mrs. Edna Gillfillan Is Awarded \$22,276

Mr. Justice Ferguson awarded Mrs. Edna Jean Gillfillan, 47, of R. R. 5, Rockwood, \$22,276 in the death of her husband, who was killed when his truck was struck by a highway bus on No. 7 highway in June.

Mrs. Frances May Gillfillan, 73, the dead man's mother, was awarded \$875. She had claimed \$1,300 because of assistance she received from her son.

A Supreme Court jury decided Robert McColl of Toronto, driver of the bus, was 75 per cent negligent in the accident for not stopping when he saw Gillfillan's truck on the highway.

Gillfillan died three days after the accident in which his wife was also injured.
