The teams were tied heading into extra time at 4 all and the hard pace they set for the Junior Raiders had a telling effect on the locals as they faded badly in overtime allowing Georgetown to pop in

four goals and skate off with an 8-4 decision.

The second place Raiders had an uphill battle all the way in front of the largest crowd to sit at a junior game here this season. They never grabbed the lead until the overtime session when the Acton crew was so tired they could hardly stand on their skates.

Charlton started the Junior Raiders off in extra time at the two minute mark completing a three way pass with Beckett and Thompson. Building Sold Use Not Known

Mayor Tyler confirmed this week he had been informed sale of a commercial property on Main St. north had been completed. The building, owned by E. Hilton, has been vacant for some time.

The Mayor, chairman of the industrial committee of council, had not been informed by the prospective purchasers what type of operation they would conduct when they visited town earlier. It is not known here whether the property will be used in light manufacturing or as a commercial retail outlet.

Final Approval Given on By-Law For Fire Hall

Final readings were given the by-law authorizing construction of a new fire hall when Acton Council met in special session Monday.

The meeting was called to deal with by-laws in preparation for a debt service issue. Council by by-law amended the interest rate of a \$30,000 bond issue from four and one quarter to five and a half.

A debt service issue of \$37,000 covering installation of watermains in the Lakewood Subdivision was approved in the third reading of the by-law.

The Ontario Municipal Board set February 22 for a public hearing to dispense with a vote of the people on increasing the paving debt from \$30,000 to \$64,000.

By resolution, Selectmen G. F. Hetherington, Q.C., was asked to represent the town.
