Colored Slides of Arctic Seen Chef, Wife Leave for Germany

The evening of Tuesday, January 22 was entertaining in several different ways for the residents of Halton Manor. At seven o'clock they assembled in the dining room to view a number of colored slides of north western Canada, particularly of the Arctic region shown by Mr. J. F. Sharpe. Mr. Sharpe, who has been working at Milton, spent one and one-half years in the Arctic station with the Distant Early Warning project, popularly known as the Dew Line, which is part of Canada's defense against Communist attacks from Siberia.

Before these pictures were shown, however, Mr. Clarke welcomed Mr. Sharpe, Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Hutchinson and Mr. and Mrs. N. Pickett to the Manor. Mr. Clarke then asked Mr. Pickett to introduce Mr. Sharpe to his Manor audience and to explain Mr. Sharpe's work on the Dew Line. After Mr. Pickett had introduced Mr. Sharpe, Mr. Sharpe spoke briefly of the beautiful aspects of the Arctic region and explained that some of the pictures had been taken within 400 miles of the North Pole. Before beginning the showing of the slides, Mr. Sharpe read two stanzas of Helena Coleman's poem, "More lovely grows the earth as we grow old."

With Mr. Hutchinson operating the projector, Mr. Sharpe began his informal and interesting commentary on these very attractive colored slides as they were thrown on the screen. Although most of the views had been taken in the Arctic regions, there were also beautiful views of Edmonton, Yellowknife and Victoria. Mr. Sharpe was very generous with his time and showed many slides that illustrated the beauty of our great Canadian northland. At the conclusion of this part of the program, a mukluk or Eskimo boot made of seal skin was shown to the audience.

After the showing of the slides, presentations were made to Mr. and Mrs. Russell Lewis, who have accepted positions with the Red Shield Auxiliary Services among the N.A.T.O. forces in Germany and who will shortly be leaving the Manor to fly to Europe. Mr. Lewis has been the capable chef at the Manor for several years and Mrs. Lewis has been his no less capable assistant.

The first presentation was from the women residents and married couples of the Manor and the address was read by Miss Harriett Metcalfe. The two gifts in this presentation, a maroon and gold desk set and a year's subscription to the Christian Herald, were presented by Anna Marie. A very appreciative and fitting speech of acceptance was given by Mrs. Lewis.

Mr. Brant of the nursing staff made the presentation of a gift of money to Mr. and Mrs. Lewis from their fellow members on the staff and Mr. Lewis made the acceptance speech in this case. It could be readily seen that the approaching departure of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis for Germany was keenly regretted and that the good wishes of many friends will follow them to Europe.

The serving of a delicious lunch of tea, fruit, bread and cookies came next on the program. This lunch was made possible by the generosity of Mrs. T. A. Hutchinson and Mrs. N. Pickett, who had prepared it and served it most attractively. It furnished the final touch to a very entertaining evening.
