Palermo Juniors, in the first of their best two out of three semi-final hockey play-offs with Milton, walked off with a decisive 6-4 win at the Milton arena Monday night. The southern invaders, after spotting the Milton team a two goal lead in the first period, blew up in the second to score all of their six tallies. Milton slipped in two more during the second affray but neither team managed to score in the hottest third period scramble at the Milton ice palace in a long time.

Graham Gillies, with an assist from John Willmott and Murray Tasker, netted Milton's first goal early in the first period and was followed shortly afterward by a blistering shot from the blue line by Murray Tasker, which slipped past Palermo twine-tender John Dillman. Graham Gillies got an assist on this one. Neither team scored again during the rest of the action packed period.

Palermo quickly tied the score in the second, as Dave Murray notched two by himself in the first minute of play. They took a five minute rest and came back to add two more goals by Ralph Booth and Max Lang. Gordon Greer and Bob Marshall picked up assists on these.

With another 10-minute stop, Marshall shot from the blue line and pocketed Palermo's fifth, with an assist to Dave Murray. Then Arnold Howden and John Willmott got together on a power play to plan to Charlie Gillies and he tallied Milton's second of the night.

Not to be outdone, Bob Marshall returned to the score sheet within five seconds to count his second and Palermo's sixth and final goal.

Milton dented the twine before the period ended, with a waist-high shot by Charlie Gillies, finishing Milton's scoring for the night.

Although neither team could beat out the net-minders during the final stanza, fans ventured in the best-contested period of the year to date.
