Greet Mrs. W. Hall At Birthday Party

A stranger in New York with the arrival of the mad bomber, George Metesky, 33, has learned that he killed 32 human beings in public places in New York since 1940.

He said he wanted to terrorize, but not to kill, people because he felt the Consolidated Edison Company, a utility firm, cheated him of compensation after an injury 10 years ago he was put in care of psychiatrists for tests.

Christian George Hanna, the stateless gambler, will know on February 1 whether he can become a Canadian citizen. The British Columbia Supreme Court will decide then whether Hanna may stay in Canada or must be deported as an immigration department decision has already ruled.

The 20-year-old man without a country, who has been wandering the oceans since the Norwegian freighter Gudvang sank 15 months ago, was taken off the ship at Vancouver after lawyer Donald S. White obtained a court order for his appearance. The freighter since has sailed, and Hanna is on remand, free without bail, pending the supreme court decision.
