### Accidents Kill Six in District

The highway traffic act statistics for the Ontario Provincial Police district three (which includes this county) and three others shows a total of 260 motor vehicle accidents during the year of 1956. Six persons lost their lives in six separate accidents.  
There were also 112 persons injured, 5,813 vehicles checked, 1,633 warnings issued and 890 charges laid.  
Of the charges laid 428 were for late of speed 92 for careless driving, four for criminal negligence, seven driving while intoxicated and 12 driving while ability was impaired.
