

Homemaking Clubs Hold Winter Achievement Day

With the Fairview school, Lowville, as its setting, the winter Achievement Day for winter County 4-H Homemaking Clubs was an interesting event on Saturday, February 2.

Under the leadership of the County Home Economist, Mrs. Mabel Bergstrom, 12 clubs in the county had been studying for the past four months. "Cotton Accesories for the Club Girl's Bedroom" and 90 members completed the project at Achievement Day. Displays were their record books, dresser spreads, chair pads and waste basket.

The meeting program consisted of judging when each girl planned eleven of four dozen scarves and four sheet sets. In one class she was required to support her judgment by giving oral reasons to each of the Home Economists. Each member also planned for a theoretical bedroom by selecting from samples provided materials which she considered suitable for bed room accessories.

The judging program was followed by remarks from visiting Home Economists giving correct placings and reasons for the classes. Those assisting were Mrs. Flora Durbin from Dufferin and Grey counties, Miss Frances Lampman from Victoria, Peterborough and Durham, and Miss Clara Lettie Griswold, newly appointed member of the Home Economics Service staff.

Following the luncheon interval many parents and other visitors arrived to show their interest in Homemaking Club work and to observe the afternoon program of exhibits, demonstrations and skits presented by the clubs on the topic of the unit "Cotton Accessories for the Club Girl's Bedroom." Bell of Billindal members Maria Mitchell and Jean Law demonstrated the topic by showing a "before and after" treatment of a scale model bedroom. Hornby Cotton Pickers gave their present action as a skit with all members Martha May, Evelyn McKay, Pat McKay, Brenda Robertson, Ruth Mason and Carol McCarron taking part, each showing the accessories she had made.

Helen and Hertha Brucker and Audrey Peacock from the Hornby Thimbles gave a demonstration on various techniques required in making bedroom accessories. The May-June New and Seven Typical teen age "Slumber Party" brought out the value of Homemaking clubs in teaching girls to redecorate and care for their own bedrooms.
