### Georgetown to Sell Debentures Of \$266,000 Thru' Local Market

GEORGETOWN -- A \$266,000 debenture issue will be floated locally.

The 5 1/2 per cent. bonds, mostly of 10 year duration, will be issued by the town and sold through the office of the town treasurer at par without the customary services of a brokerage firm.

The town, at the same time, is marketing another large quantity of debentures through the Ontario Municipal Investment Corporation.

At Monday's council meeting, finance chairman Garfield McGillivray expressed confidence that the bonds will be readily disposed of locally. There is a possibility that local industries will be asked to co-operate in payroll deduction plans for those wishing to buy on installments, similar to the way that federal Savings Bonds are marketed.

Mayor Armstrong said that it is the first time in the town's history that such a bond issue has been attempted. Neighboring towns have

had good experience, he said, in similar ventures. Acton has sold \$110,000 and Milton \$35,000 in the same way, and the town is confident that buyers will be found for the issue.

### James' Malden Farm Has Ankonian Bull

At the recent Ankonian Sale held at Rhinebeck, New York, manager Jim McKay purchased a herd sire for Malden Farm, Hornby, owned by Dr. W. F. Janica.

This bull is a son of the reserve champion bull in Chicago in both 1950 and 1951. He himself was first prize senior calf at the Eastern National Show in Maryland, and stood second in a string class at the Chicago International in 1956.

Forty bulls and 27 females averaged \$3,161 at this sale.

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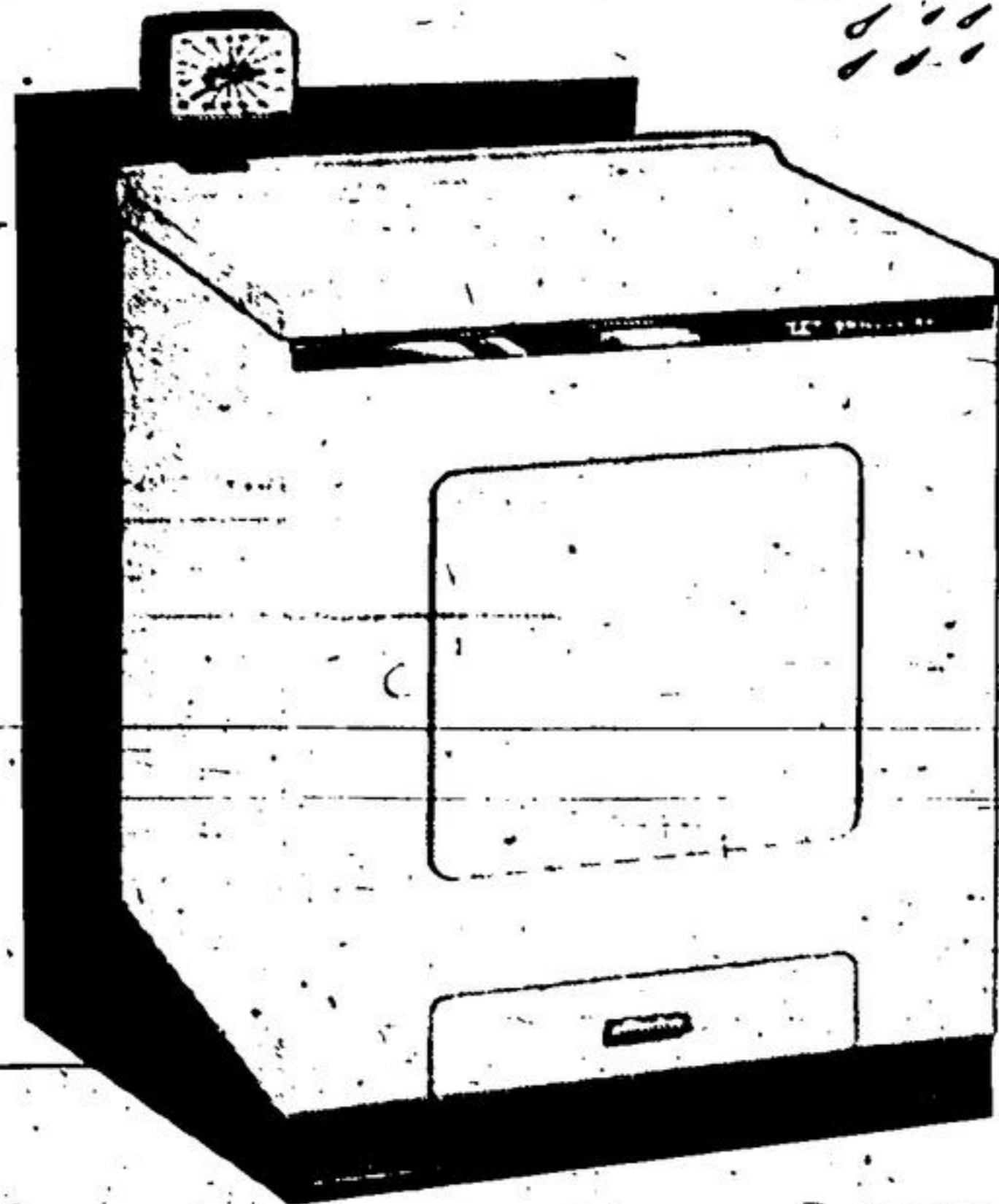
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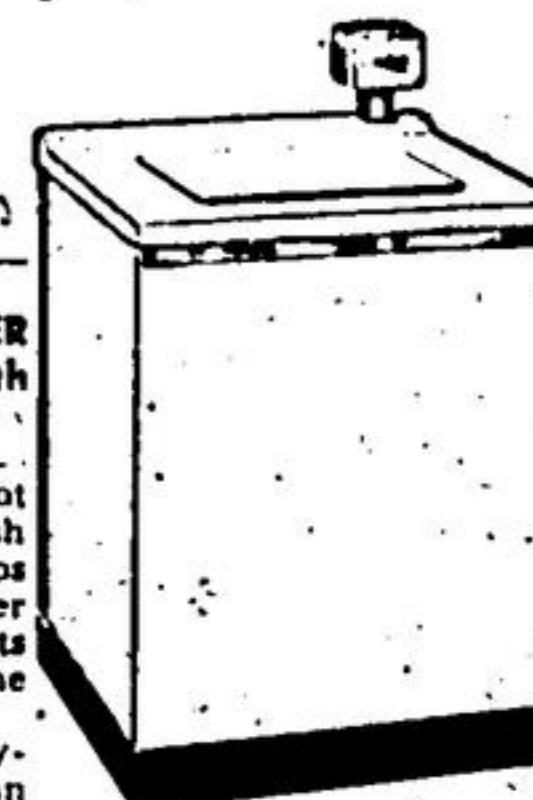
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
