### Maurice Beaty To be President Of Jersey Club

Maurice C. Beaty, Lindale Jersey Farm, H.H. A. Milton, is elected President of the Acton Jersey Cattle Club at the annual meeting in Montreal this week.

Mr. Beaty is one of Canada's outstanding Jersey breeders and judge, and has been twice designated a Constructive Breeder, the highest honor a Jersey breeder can receive.

His herd did exceptionally well at Chicago International Dairy Show last fall. His cattle have won many top awards at the Royal Winter Fair and he has developed and bred many outstanding Jersey sires. He has judged Jersey shows from Halifax to Vancouver and is one of Halifax County's outstanding farmers.
