Stan Hall Provincial M.P. Reports on Week's Events

Following is the second message to the people of Halton County from Stan Hall, M.P.P. for the County, dealing in brief with the highlights of the past week's legislative sessions.

Hon. Leslie M. Frost, Premier of Ontario, indicated the Ontario Legislature will be asked to vote more money for the Ontario Municipal Improvement Corporation which was set up with a \$50,000,000 fund.

Mr. T. Pryde, Progressive Conservative for Huron County, asked the Ontario Government to build its proposed \$10,000,000 School for Retarded Children in Huron County.

Hon. A. Kelso Roberts, Attorney General, moved second reading of a Bill, Number 65, an Act to change the name of the Church of England in Canada to the Anglican Church of Canada.

Federal and Provincial officials met in private to discuss Ontario's proposed Hospital Insurance plan.

Hon. A. Kelso Roberts, Attorney General, said it is up to Federal Justice officials to decide whether McDonald get back their \$50,000 bond.

Progressive Conservative William Murdoch, Essex South, said in his address that the hazard to fruit and vegetable growing industry in Ontario is the importation of foreign fruits and vegetables. What the Canadian Growers are asking for is the Canadian Market for Canadian Producers during the Canadian season, but they cannot obtain the proper compensation at Ottawa. In 1955 more than \$20,000,000 worth of foreign fruits and vegetables were imported into Canada.

Mr. A. Wren, Liberal Labor Member for Kenora, in his address, mentioned the birthday party for Prime Minister the Hon. St. Laurent and said that \$10.00 a plate was paid for dinner with imported wine. Mr. Wren said that the Liberals can pay \$10.00 a plate for one meal but they expect our old age pensioners of Canada to live on \$40.00 per month.

Mr. Ross Wheeler, Liberal for Bruce, intimated that John Foster Dulles, Secretary of State for the United States of America, had been out of season on his private island in Ontario.

Hon. Leslie M. Frost assured the Assembly that if evidence could be produced that John Foster Dulles had been out of season in Ontario, that he would be prosecuted.

Hon. Leslie M. Frost said Ontario Fish and Game Laws must be observed by everyone including those who own private islands and preserves.

Mr. Albert Wren, Liberal Labor member for Kenora, said Liquor permits and all the needless scribbling that goes on should be abolished.

Mr. Arthur Child, Progressive Conservative for Wentworth, said the head of the Ontario Athletic Commission should appear before a House Committee to explain the disgusting behavior shown in some professional wrestling matches.

Mr. A. Grossman, Progressive Conservative member for St. Andrew's, Toronto, said that more should be done both for Health and the education of our mentally retarded children. Mr. Grossman believes that as a people we do not realize the size of this problem.

Mr. Windermeyer, Liberal Waterloo North, said in his address that Ontario can do irreparable harm if it accepts only part of the Federal government's tax credit offer. It was said in Conservation Committee by the Department of Planning and Development that \$16,000,000 had been spent in Ontario on conservation projects. The Department of Planning and Development is paying \$1.00 for dollar worth of Municipalities. The Federal government does not pay anything towards an undertaking unless the cost is \$5,000,000 or over.

Mr. Baver, Progressive Conservative, Muskoka, said in his address that the District of Muskoka plants 7,000,000 trees a year and the same amount is planted on private property. J. W. McConnell of Montreal gave a \$500,000 McConnell Memorial Foundation to be used for charitable and educational purposes in the Muskoka District.

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May Purchase New Ambulance For Brigade at Georgetown

GEORGETOWN — By a slim majority, after Mayor Armstrong asked for a recorded vote in order that he could oppose the motion, Georgetown council voted to call for tenders for the newly formed Ambulance Brigade.

The motion caused a lengthy discussion, centering around present tight credit with Cr. Garfield McGilvray leading a minority faction which favors purchasing the ambulance being used at present by the McClure firm. Mr. McClure has offered this to the town for \$600.

Estimates submitted by Reeve Stan Allen showed that a new vehicle would cost from \$1,500 to \$4,000 depending on what equipment the town demands and the model which council would choose.

"Georgetown is the first town in Ontario to have this service and every eye is on us," said Cr. Alfred Sykes. He said council would be severely criticized if they put an old vehicle on the road and scrapped it a year later.

Cr. Ern Hyde pointed out that the McClure ambulance has only gone 28,000 miles, though it is five years old, and it has new tires.

The vote found the reeve, deputy and Crs. Sykes, Gray and Harrison in favor, with the mayor and Crs. McGilvray, Hyde and Hae registering opposition.

Council is arranging with the hydro commission to rent a garage on Cross St. where the ambulance will be housed. Cr. Hyde questioned thought of a \$300 expenditure for heating this building, but as property chairman, was put in charge of investigating some form of heating to ensure that the ambulance is ready for instant use at all times.

Reeve Allen expressed concern that when the system is functioning, there will be problems when calls are received from surrounding parts of Georgetown.

Georgetown should not spend money to provide service to another municipality, he said, yet there could be severe criticism if calls were turned down. It would be best, he said, to immediately seek some financial arrangement with the township.

At his suggestion, Equestrian council will be invited to meet with Georgetown council.

Staggered School System is Baffling To Truant Officer

OAKVILLE—Oakville truant officer Mrs. Grace Shipley admits that the Oakville-Trafalgar High School's staggered system has her baffled.

In her annual report to Oakville school board, Mrs. Shipley said, "With these staggered school hours, students are wandering about the streets and going to school at all hours. It's hard to say whether they're playing hooky or not."

However, Mrs. Shipley admits that being truant officer in a small town has its advantages.

"Once, while walking along the street, I walked right into a truant," she recalled.

In listing six truancy cases during the year, Mrs. Shipley said attendance records for the year were better than the previous year.

District Delegates At Leadership Forum

Approximately 100 neglected delegates are attending Ontario's first Provincial Rural Leadership Forum at Prudhommes Garden Centre, Vineland, Ont., from February 17 to 23. Each county and district in the Province of Ontario had the opportunity of selecting two delegates to attend. The sponsoring provincial organizations are also sending a limited number of delegates.

The Leadership Forum is held under the sponsorship of the Ontario Rural Leadership Forum committee made up of several Ontario farm organizations, the Department of Agriculture and the Ontario Department of Education.

The purpose of this Leadership Forum is to give rural people the opportunity to discuss needs and problems in Ontario's rural communities and to learn basic techniques and procedures that will enable rural people to work more effectively in their local organizations and communities. With the rural scene constantly changing, there is a great need for informed and capable leaders.
