\$3,000 Administration Need Approved For 16 Mile Creek Conservation Group

Members of the 16 Mile Creek Conservation Authority, at their regular meeting in Trafalgar hall Tuesday afternoon, set an administrative budget of \$3,000 for 1957. The \$3,000 will include educational program \$1,200, administration \$1,000, public relations \$500, secretary-treasurer's salary \$300.

Milton's share will be \$207.05. The rest will be divided as follows: Esquimaux, \$123.90, Nassagaweya, \$37.65, Oakville, \$530.71, Trafalgar, \$600.00.

The Department of Planning and Development, Conservation Branch pays half the rate of division among the municipalities. It is based on six cents from each person living within the boundaries of the watershed in their municipality. Any improvements of projects made by the authority will be paid for by the municipality or municipalities which benefit from it.

Juniors Lose to Elmira 7-2

Marshall in the Acton net, was victimized by freak bounces of the puck on at least two goals of the seven that eluded him, but like most of his mates was not having a good night. There was little defense projection and efforts to clear the puck out of the Acton end were often futile.

Elmira elected to play it cagey, content to forecheck and let the locals bring the play to them. It was the right strategy for the visitors. It disorganized the Acton attack and hurried their shooting to the point of being ineffective.

Elmira's goalie was also a big stumbling block for the Acton team, although at times he was made to look better by shots directed right into his pads. The two that got past him were potted by Cuxe and Baxter with Bill Coon doing the spade work on both. This threesome were the best unit for Acton.
