Work Inquiries, Tree Trimming New Shop-Door P.U.C. Topics

Routine business on the agenda of the regular meeting of Acton Public Utilities Commission was handled in a two hour meeting.

It was reported enquiries had been received for work as hydro linemen but the Commission decided to forego any further hiring until after the agreement had been signed with the local union.

Commission members were also informed the transformer on Bower and John and one on John St. had been replaced. Tree trimming had also been completed.

Commissioner Everdell reported finding doors open at the hydro shop, keys left in the truck and the spotlight left on. The chairman Mayor Tyler was instructed to investigate the possibility of installing a new door to allow for the housing of another truck at the building.

Superintendent Lambert reported he had begun the program of meter cleaning and replacing.

Superintendent Duby reported outside lights being shot out at the disposal plant. The police were to be contacted.

The town requested vapor lights be installed on Mill St. from Main St. to the tracks.

The superintendent and secretary were delegated to attend the O.M.E.A. and A.M.E.U. convention with other members attending if possible.

V. E. Scott has been appointed conciliation officer to attempt settlement on the collective agreement following the breakdown of negotiations. The secretary was to contact the officials, asking that the meeting be held at night rather than during the day.

The secretary-treasurer was authorized to credit the consumer's deposit the amount of \$15 to the account of D. McIntosh, Victoria St.

Commission members agreed to their portion of the salaries for employees as worked out with council representatives and approved by them.

The salary of D. Mason was set at \$4,000 plus \$100 for 1957, for J. Lambert \$3,600 plus \$100. All hourly employees are to be paid at a starting salary of \$1.05 per hour with increases after three and six months. The \$100 to superintendent is to be paid on the first of December, 1957, with no portion to be paid prior to that.
