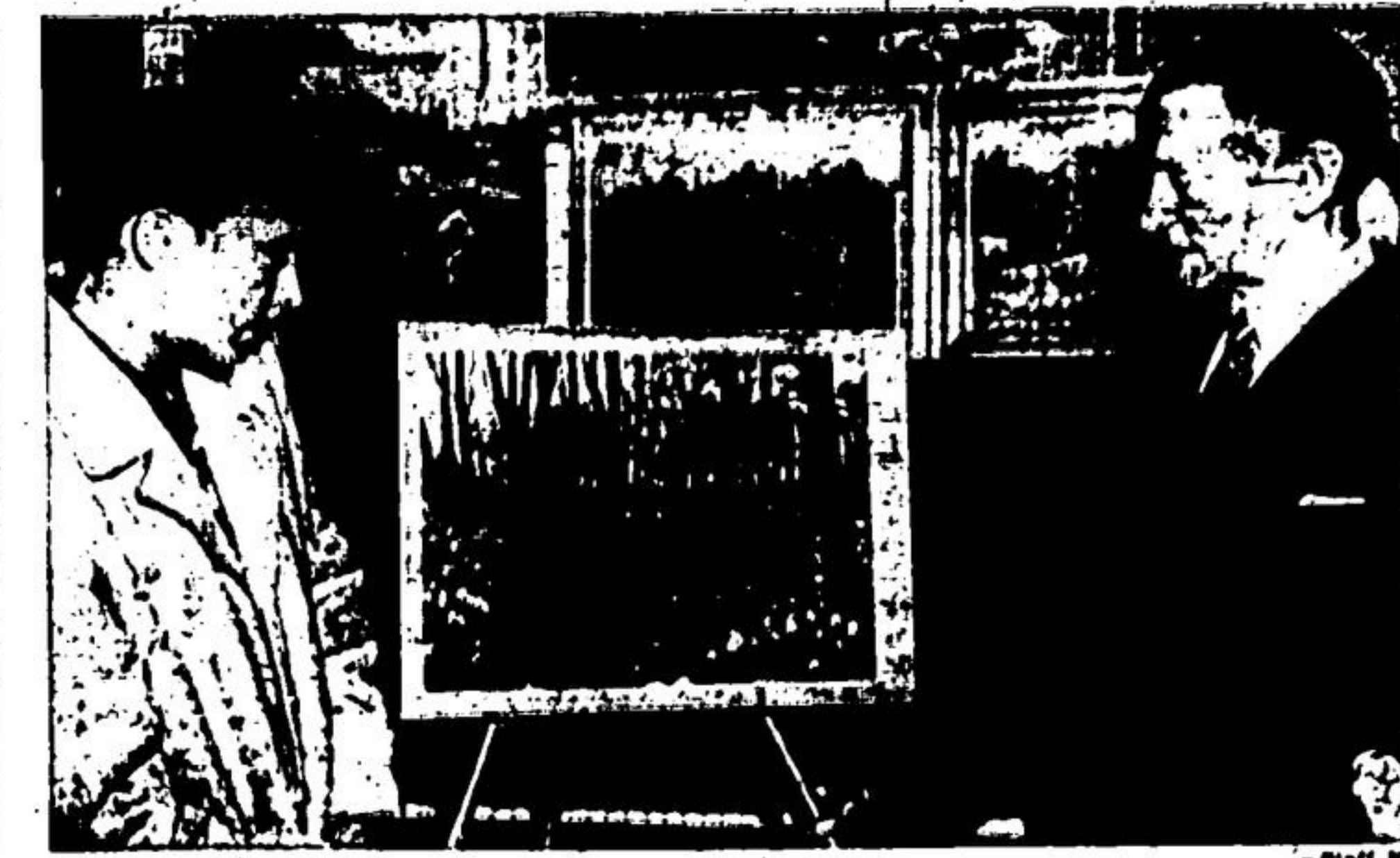
Minister Accepts Rockwood Charge
