

Speaker Cites Agricultural Challenges Warns Juniors "No Primrose Path"

"Farming is at an economic level lower than other branches of industry in the agricultural countries of the world," warned Russell McAllister, president of the Ontario Junior Farmers' Association, at the seventh annual banquet and dance of the Halton Junior Farmers Friday evening in Trafalgar hall.

The 1000 head of the active organization went on to state that "the outcome for the management required in running a farm is much too small for the work involved."

Newell, opened the three-hour program with the singing of The Lord's Prayer, followed by the Queen.
