

Al Logan Galt Y Secretary Guest Speaker at 8th Banquet

"It is up to us what we make of the world," declared Al Logan, guest speaker in his address to the Eighth Annual Father and Son Banquet at the Legion Auditorium, Thursday, March 14.

The dinner, sponsored by the Y's Men's club of Acton, was attended by approximately 200 fathers and sons.

Bill Benson introduced Mr. Logan, who gave several personal experiences encountered by various friends of his. One was a 78 year old grandmother, an excellent swimmer and diver, who is teaching retarded children to swim and exercise in her spare time. Another was a good friend who had been a pilot during World War II and is now a Professor at Ohio University, whose interest lies in rehabilitating disabled veterans.

Many of these veterans thought their life useless and without purpose but through guidance, kindness and patience, they are able to participate in various types of sport such as football, archery and

swimming in both instances, the work is done gratis out of a sincere desire to be of service, he said.

Mr. Logan stated, "The society that we would want to live in and develop is entirely up to us, and that personal satisfaction in helping others should be more rewarding than to be remunerated in dollars and cents."

Harry Otterbein thanked the speaker for his enlightening talk.
