

Stan Hall Provincial M.P. Reports on Week's Events

Premier Frost gave notice of a motion that would set up an 11-man select committee to study the operation and administration of the Labor Relations Act.

Welfare Minister Cecil introduced legislation which he said would give greater protection to children in private boarding homes. C.C.F. Leader MacDonald said the Department of Reform Institutions must throw out its Victorian approach to reform.

Premier Frost said the great majority of the people feel the reform institutions are well run.

Reg. Gibson (C.C.F. - Wentworth East) defended his party against a charge that it is the moderate wing of the Communist party.

Under an amendment to the Unconditional Grants Act, an additional grant of \$1.00 per capita is being made.

In the County of Halton in the year 1956, the total cost of the administration of justice was about \$48,823. In that year the Province of Ontario repaid to the County of Halton as its share of the cost of the administration of justice, \$10,822. Therefore, the County had to raise from the various local municipalities in the County approximately \$37,930.

Under the new system, the local municipalities in Halton County on the 1955 population basis will receive \$22,800, or about \$14,000, more than the total cost to the County for the administration of justice.

Honorable John Exler, Minister of Prison Reform Institutions, said in his address that the training course given our Reform School Guards has been accepted by the United Nations Committee and is being taught in most free countries of the world.

A resolution presented by H. A. Worton, Wellington South, pertaining to grants for new schools, was ruled out of order by the Speaker. The Leader of the Opposition, Honorable Farquhar Oliver, called for a vote which resulted in the resolution being defeated 79 to 10, the C.C.F. group voting with the government.

Mr. G. F. Laverge, Progressive Conservative, Russell, announced in the legislature on March 26 that that was the 700th day in the County of Russell without a fatal accident on the Queen's Highway in Russell County.

Bill No. 119, an Act to amend the Mining Tax Act, a second reading was opposed by the Liberal Opposition who called for a vote, the C.C.F. again voting with the government. The vote was 78-11.

Honorable Louis Cecil, Q.C., Minister of Public Welfare, said that the Department of Public Welfare would distribute to the citizens of Ontario during this fiscal year, \$34,000,000 in the different departments.

Premier Frost accused Justice Minister Garson of making misleading statements in the House of Commons on Ontario's fiscal relations with the federal government.

Indian chiefs of the Six Nations Reserve petitioned the Legislature to repeal an act dealing with marriages since it is an act specifically applying to Indians and so not within the power of the legislature.

Addition to Building By Printing Company

TB Disrupts Many Families Hardship; Heartbreak Result

Tuberculosis disrupts more families for a longer period of time than any other disease, says Dr. A. Hull, Medical Officer of Health for Halton County.

Last year 3,000 Ontario people entered TB sanatoria, each for an average of one year's treatment. "To spend over a year in hospital is no picnic," he said. "It means tremendous disruption in the home."
