Falling Death Rate

Result of Treatment

Halton M.O. States

The commonly held belief that Ontario's falling death rate is a result of reduced incidence of disease was attacked by Dr. A. Bull, Medical Officer of Health for Halton County.

The TB death rate is down," Dr. Bull said, "but that doesn't mean there are fewer cases of the disease. This interpretation of the TB death rate can be dangerous. It adds to the apathy in our population which is already too complacent about tuberculosis," he concluded.

The year 1955 gave Ontario a further decline in deaths in spite of an increase of 203 admissions to sanatorium over 1954.

The falling death rate is the result of improved treatment," the doctor said. "There are patients who had been with us for years. We expected them to spend the rest of their lives in sanatorium.

But since the development of the new drugs, they benefited sufficiently to go home to their families."

Pruned \$30,000 But

Burlington Mill Rate up Two

BURLINGTON With the amount required by the high council sitting in committee following the recent regular meeting, Burlington's mill rates for 1957 were set, and as expected, there was a raise over last year of two mills in the residential part and 4.7 mills in the industrial and business sections.

For the first time this year, two mill rates were necessitated by the decision of the Department of Municipal Affairs to apply the unconditional grants to the residents only. In 1956 this grant benefitted all taxpayers in Burlington to the extent of slightly over one mill. This year these grants were increased and benefit the residents by 2.7 mills. Commercial and industrial assessments received no benefit whatever.

The town this year has a budget of \$606,219.71, the mill rate for the industrial and business assessment is 4.7 mills and for residential and farm assessments 4.3 mills. Last year's mill rate was \$2.01 mills.

Councillor G. Kerr, chairman of the finance committee, said that at the last committee meeting, members pruned nearly \$30,000 or two mills off the estimates which had been discussed at a former meeting.

They started to work on the budgets showing a mill rate of 4.5 mills and brought it down to 4.3 mills.

As main reason for the raise, Councillor Kerr mentioned the high school budget which showed a quite unexpected increase over last year's requirements. Last year

Other reasons for the increase in the mill rates are the one and a half mills for the hospital, the increased budget of the works department in connection with the proposed extension of Elgin Street, increased administration costs and an increase in the county levy. There is an increase in assessment of about one million dollars.
