Halton Game Warden Brought Beaver Here As Conservation Aid

Albert Dudley Hitchcock of Oakville, game warden of Halton County for the past 14 years, died Sunday night in his 62nd year.

Mr. Hitchcock was born at Great Bookham, Surrey, England. He joined the Department of Lands and Forests as game warden and conservation officer in 1943.

He was instrumental in bringing beaver to Halton County. Several years ago, he brought a pair from a northern section of the province. This year special permits were issued to trap the animals on a minor scale in this section.

Surviving are his wife, the former Minnie Frost of Simcoe, three sons, one daughter, two grandchildren, five sisters and two nephews.

Dr. R.D. Buckner Guest Speaker At Devonshire Chapter I.O.D.E.

The regular monthly meeting of the Duke of Devonshire Chapter I.O.D.E. was held April 3 at the home of Mrs. Kenneth Knox. The regent, Mrs. B. Mowat, opened the meeting with a poem, Spring, by Archibald Lampman.

Tribute to the memory of Miss Pearl Smith, who had been a member for over 20 years, was made by Miss M. Z. Bennett, after which all members joined in a moment of silence.

Mrs. R. D. Buckner, as convenor of Empire and World Affairs, discussed two aspects of the world situation. These were "Victims of the Bear," Hungary remaining helpless as a bleeding, mauled witness of the kind of help victims of the red bear may expect from the west, and "Moral for Today," the NO but inescapable fact being that NO has little or no moral force. It professes to be an association to prevent or repel aggression, yet counts among its most powerful members the most heartless and cynical aggressors in the modern world, she said.

Mrs. D. Desjardis, who is moving to Alliston, was presented with a cup and saucer.

The guest speaker was Dr. R. D. Buckner, who spoke on his work at the neuro-psychiatric centre at the Guelph Reformatory. This centre, which is headed by Dr. Buckner, is an experiment, the only one of its kind in Canada. Since it began two years ago, it has had 150 patients who are drawn from any of the Department of Reformatory institutions. The centre has two purposes, research and treatment. It examines the patients and tries to correct their feelings.

Along with the staff, which includes Dr. Buckner as psychiatrist, a psychologist, a secretary, nursing staff and custodial officers, the patients themselves are part of the treatment team. As the new inmates are brought to the centre, they are introduced to the older ones, who persuade them to receive treatment and who act as a social force.

Dr. Buckner explained that when a man goes into the Reformatory,

he must have discipline, otherwise he will be destructive. However, when he is released, there is no discipline and he still rebels. The centre tries to teach the men to control their impulses.

Treatment includes giving patients carbon dioxide, which releases their tensions and helps them to talk about their feelings. The patients are given psychological tests and are shown movies of mental mechanisms, after which discussion takes place.

The centre has an EEG machine, which records electrical current going through the brain. While 10 per cent of the general population tested with the machine are found to be abnormal, at the Reformatory 150 out of 250 tested were found to be abnormal. This shows that there is a physical basis to mental disorders.

"Is it worth it?" Dr. Buckner asked. The centre is very expensive and it is cheaper to put the patients in cells. Dr. Buckner felt that while the inmates are not being altered, they are being helped. The main problem is the difficulty in following up the patients when he is released from the Reformatory.

The attitude of the inmates is "We paid our price and should be treated decently." Yet work is hard to find and the man with a record has many problems to face. Improved rehabilitation work is very important.

Mrs. H. Mainprize thanked Dr. Buckner and informal discussion continued during refreshments. Toasts were given by Mrs. Kennedy, Mrs. Morrison, Mrs. Lambert and Mrs. Layton.

The question asked was: "Does poor education have anything to do with becoming unemployed?" The answer provided by the N.E.S. survey, the first of its kind ever taken, is "Yes, both directly and indirectly."
