

Township Turns Down Grant To Agriculture Federation

The April meeting of Kramois township council was held in the town hall with Reeve J. L. Oakes presiding.

The meeting was addressed by B. F. C. Houston of Kitchener, who asked that consideration be given to passing a by-law to establish a Civil Defense Committee. The reeve assured Mr. Houston that consideration would be given his request and that it would be discussed further at the next meeting.

R. Hamilton, D. H. Storey and G. Willey waited on council to request that the practice of making a grant to the Federation of Agriculture be discontinued.

Moved by Councillors Benham and McNabb that the usual grant be given the Federation. The motion was lost and the clerk was instructed to notify the secretary of the Federation that the grant was refused.

Tenders for supplying crushing and delivering gravel were opened and read. Roy Dobson, Arthur, 45 cents per yard, Holman Construction, Rockwood, 76c per yard. The lower tender was accepted. Work is to be under supervision of the road superintendent and subject to the approval of the Department of Highways.

The motion carried that by-law 10-1947 regarding daylight saving time be observed from 12:01 Sunday, April 28 to 12:01 a.m. Sunday, September 29, 1957.

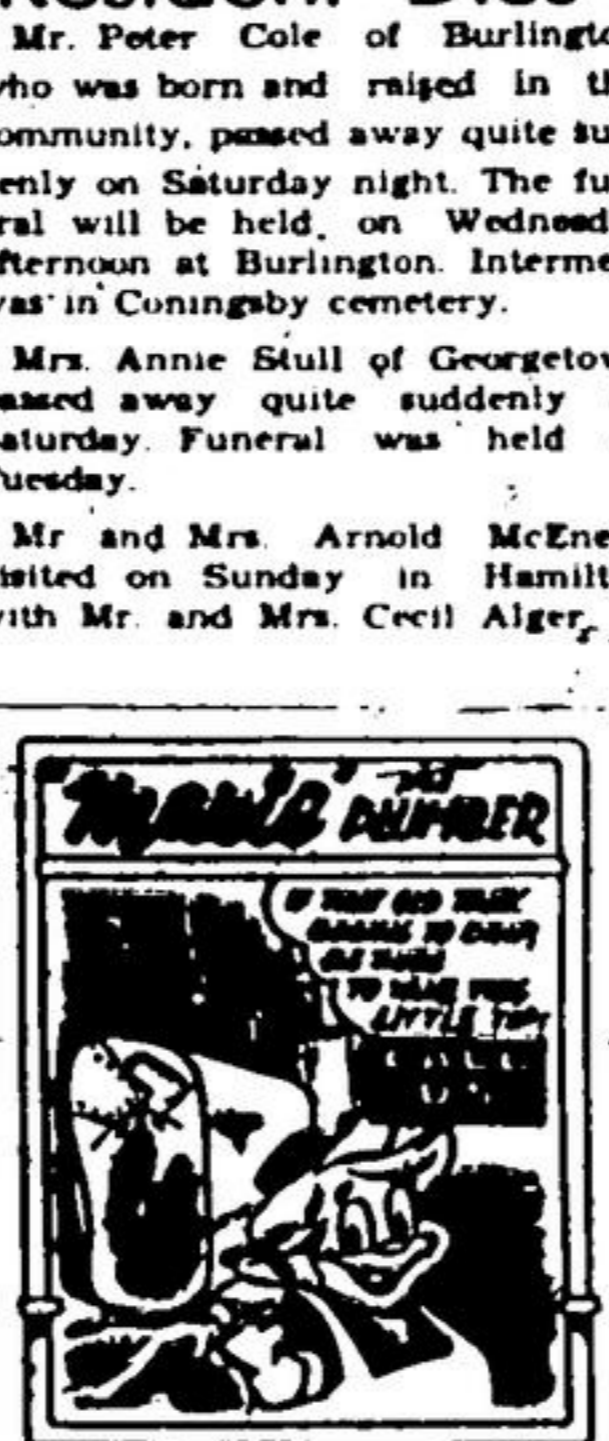

Falling Death Rate Result of Treatment Halton M.O. States

The commonly held belief that Ontario's falling death rate is a result of reduced incidence of disease was attacked by Dr. A. Bull, Medical Officer of Health for Halton County.

"The TB death rate is down," Dr. Bull said, "but that doesn't mean there are fewer cases of the disease. This interpretation of the TB death rate can be dangerous. It adds to the apathy in our population which is already too complacent about tuberculosis," he concluded.

The year 1955 gave Ontario a further decline in deaths in spite of an increase of 203 admissions to sanatorium over 1954.

"The falling death rate is the result of improved treatment," the doctor stated. "There are patients who had been with us for years. We expected them to spend the rest of their lives in sanatorium. But since the development of the new drugs, they benefited sufficiently to go home to their families."
