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Start Repair and Replacement Work

Bell Telephone construction crews have started repair and replacement work throughout the north-east and north-west rural areas of the local exchange. C. S. Keith, Bell Telephone manager for this region, said today.

Business and residential expansion in the vicinity of Crewson's Corners and throughout the territory has necessitated the project.

"In order to accommodate the forecast telephone growth in the latter territory, additional facilities will be required for a distance of about five miles," the manager said.

The outside plant repair work involves the removal of 500 poles, the placing of approximately 300 new poles and the resetting of 10 miles where practical, some 19 miles of wire will be replaced.

Relief and extension measures include the erecting of 33 poles, the placing of 44 crossarms and the installation of eight circuit miles of aerial wire at various locations along the north-west telephone route. Nearly two miles of rural wire will also be strung along this route.

The project is scheduled to be completed by late summer.

Delegates Acclaim Hosking as Candidate

A Liberal Convention held in Guelph last Saturday acclaimed Henry Hosking standard bearer in the coming federal election. Mr. Hosking is presently the member in parliament for South Wellington.

Mr. Hosking is confined to a bed in Ottawa General hospital where he has been for two weeks. He suffered a sudden indisposition on a night train returning to Ottawa and left the train at Ottawa to get treated by a doctor.

Tribute after tribute was paid to the member on Saturday night. The crowning tribute was paid by Minister of Health and Welfare Paul Martin who described Henry Hosking as "one of the most conscientious, devoted and dedicated members — a man whose constant endeavor is for all his constituents and for his country."

Mr. Martin told the throng of delegates that he was sure news of their judgment would have a considerable bearing on Mr. Hosking's quick recovery and his early return to the riding of South Wellington to outline the policies of the party of which he was distinguished and loyal member.
