Await Engineer's Water Report Study Source Development Plan

Further enquiries to the Ontario Water Resources Commission on the possibility of their assuming development of the new water source for the town, were arranged when Action council met Tuesday night.

Councillor Cooke, reporting on action of the water committee reviewed a meeting with the engineer from the R. V. Anderson firm regarding the cost of the installation of the pump and the rates from the source to Peel St. A guess estimate was given at between \$35,000 and \$40,000. This would not include the reservoir. A full report was promised to the Action water committee by May 7.

Also interviewed at this meeting was a representative from the Ontario Water Resources Commission, who reviewed their position in such a project and outlined what the OWRC could take over the project. It was noted that the commission would determine the issue and the town would pay back on an annual basis.

A motion was passed to investigate further with the Commission. The town would carry on an at present, pending receipt of the engineer's report.

Council approved appointment of Clayton Lindsay to the Public Utilities Commission for the termination of Wayne Kelly's term and Dr. F. G. Oakes was appointed to complete the balance of E. Huffnagel's term. Both Mr. Kelly and Mr. Huffnagel resigned from the commission recently.

A resolution was read from county council objecting to annexation of any part of Halton County to Wentworth County.

A by-law was passed for the signing of a contract for \$25,000 with J. B. Mackenzie and Son for the construction of a new fire hall.

The usual performance bond is to be issued by the contractor.

Authorization was given for the purchase of the Warren and Davison property under lease to the town for water development. The Warren property is to cost \$1,000 and the Davison property \$500.

The road committee was instructed to investigate an offer of Donald Campbell to allow use of his property for sanitary landfill.

A course of revision agreed to cancel taxes on a property to be demolished.

A \$63,500. debtors by-law for paving was given the third reading.

A letter was received from a home owner complaining of water in the basement and the conditions resulting. The road committee was instructed to inspect the situation.

The auditor's report was read and council agreed to purchase 200

County Report To Recommend Per Bed Grant

The Hospital Committee of Halton County Council met for a special meeting Tuesday evening to hire legal aid to represent them in the proposed annexation to Wentworth of Burlington and Nelson. Solon C. Wei was named, provided he is not representing Nelson township in the hearing. Mr. Wei is the township solicitor at present.

An alternate named was R. H. Hargrave of Guelph.

Reeve Stan Allan of Georgetown said the county was not allowed to speak at the Monday and Tuesday hearings of the OMB in Toronto when Burlington and Nelson - East Flamborough officials met to put out details on the merged land when the annexation takes place the first of next year.

Mr. Allan said the county would argue the legality of Wentworth's application to take away about one-tenth of the county, as the move had never been made in Ontario or as far as anyone knows, in Canada. If there's nothing in the Act saying it's legal, then it's illegal, he said.

The County of Halton shall issue debentures in the amount of \$600 per bed per hospital in the county.

2. Before issuing these debentures, each municipality shall show financial security in the amount of 40 per cent in cash, guaranteed pledges and government grants.

3. Each municipality launching a hospital scheme is to provide for the present requirements.

It was felt by the third point per bed costs in future could be kept at a minimum. County council meeting earlier turned down a recommendation for a one-mill levy for a three and a half year period. The report was based on the finding

County Objects To Wentworth Annexation Bid

Strong opposition to the annexation of any part of the County was registered at a special meeting of Halton County council Friday afternoon in Milton after it was learned that Wentworth county had approved a by-law authorizing an application to the Ontario Municipal Board to annex to Wentworth all of the township of Nelson, the town of Burlington, and the now-annexed part of East Flamborough.

It is believed that this is the first time that one county in Ontario has ever sought to annex a part of another.

In making the application, Wentworth County seeks to add thousands of acres of territory, approximately 25,000 people, and roughly \$33,000,000 in assessment.

The assessment in Burlington and Nelson Township amounts to 25 per cent of Halton County's \$128,000,000 dollar assessment.

Council passed three motions to obtain legal advice to protect the interests of Halton County, to appoint a committee composed of all county committee chairmen to work with the county collector and with power to act, and to go on record as strongly opposing the annexation of any part of Halton County by Wentworth County.

Group Studies Subdividers' Agreement Plans for Town's Future Development

Council Clears Chambers Puts Tenders Under Wraps

It was noted that if a committee meeting was held on the subject the press wouldn't be there and that would keep the subject confidential.

A resolution empowering the finance committee to review the tenders and control to make an agreement was tabled, withdrawn, tabled and debated.

Councillor Lowe questioned how council could take the best possible decision when they wouldn't be aware of the terms.

Deacon continued on whether the press could be asked to withdraw the figures whether the gallery should be cleared, there were three previous discussions whether the tender could be opened and whether we have a confidence in our customers.

Councillor Watt objected to this procedure noting other members of council should be aware of the figures submitted as well as a committee.

To arguments that the tenders were sealed publicly, Councillor Cook indicated there was a vast difference between a public tender and a tender that is made public.

Councillor Watt argued the auditors might review the auditors report for 1956 showing an operating deficit of \$15,000.

Largest contributing factor appeared to be shortage of \$10,417.32 over estimate on sewer operation. Well drilling also added \$3,275 and the highway subsidy was reduced \$1,115.37 because of the paving program.

Additional revenue was received over estimates on service charge, road work and taxes.

According to the report which covers to the end of 1956 only, the schedule of work in progress for which debentures were to be sold subsequently issued totalled \$290,346.

Total debenture debt as shown in the report totalled \$417,630.

The waterworks department showed an award winning deficit of \$6,010.45 which members explained was due to the heavy work program carried out in conjunction with the road paving program. It was suggested about 10 years next year had been carried out last year to avoid future damage to the hard-top.

The Hydro department showed an operating surplus of \$24,800.33.

On the Action Public School Board budget of \$116,054.01, a surplus of \$5,409.40 was indicated by the report. Largest expenditure was for salaries at \$60,144.

The Action Cemetery Board showed a balance sheet of \$26,249.00 with \$23,134.00 held as a reserve for perpetual care.

Action Free Library operated on a deficit of \$346.35 on a total budget of \$6,030.08. Action Citizens Band showed a deficit of \$90.00.

The Planning Board registered a deficit of \$238.87. The North Halton Urban Board showed a surplus of \$151.97.

Meeting in Milton last night Wednesday, representatives from Milton, Georgetown and Georgetown to the North Halton Urban Board ranged over a number of common subjects including fire area agreements, engineers a speculated development in Esquerring township, dog control, supplying of water to homes outside the municipalities, police forces, annexations and road side tables on highways.

Discussing fire agreements with the townships Reeve J. Hargrave of Action and a member of Esquerring council had recently that if the Georgetown brigade terminates its services with the expiration of the contract this summer, there was a possibility the township would set up its own police and fire forces.

Esquerring will see the biggest single development that has ever taken place in Ontario, Reeve Allan of Georgetown quoted O. Pearson of the Department of Planning and Development as saying. He said a recent conversation with the minister had informed him a huge industrial and residential development stretching from Hurontario to Stewartstown was in the offing. Other board members hinted the development might stretch further north than that.

Councillor McCrae asked for cheques for \$1,200 from each municipality towards the dog control system. Members reviewed their respective plans of dogs running at large and it was apparent the dogs were getting so accustomed to the track they could easily avoid it. It was decided to ask for a Humane Society representative to attend the next board meeting.

In reply to a question from Councillor Reid of Milton, Georgetown representatives replied they served water only to out-of-town properties along the main supply line.

Members took no action on a private request for an answer to the present problem of not enough police for the townships, explaining police were not available at the present.

Representatives also discussed at length the annexation in the south of the county and decided to petition the Department of Highways for non-intermediate tables on highways 14, 15, 16, 17 and 18.

The resignation of Frank Palleson, Action - Milton engineer, was accepted with regret and his last mileage account was ordered paid.
